### 1. Call to order:

Mr. Doetsch called the Special Meeting to order at 3:05 p.m. He reminded the Board that no action would be taken in the absence of a quorum.

## 2. <u>Discussion of North Carolina Department of Transportation and Wilmington Urban</u> Area MPO Initiatives with NCDOT Secretary Jim Trogdon III

Mr. Trogdon expressed appreciation to the Board. He stated that he served for 25 years at NCDOT, the last three (3) years as a consulting engineer on the east coast, and the last year at the SAS Institute addressing traffic issues nationwide. He pointed out that although needs differ from city to city, there are no new transportation problems – only new opportunities to apply lessons learned with the right applications and support.

Mr. Trogdon stated that his first priority is improvement of project delivery. He noted that in the last five (5) years on schedule delivery of projects within the TIP averaged 78 percent (statewide, 95%; regional, 50%; and Division, 60%). He pointed out that the focus is to stay on schedule, and for the Divisions to deliver more Regional and Division-tier projects with compressed and improved timelines. He expressed the desire to reduce cycles from 10 and 14 years, to one to three (1-3) years.

A brief question/answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Trogdon told members that he requested a delay in the approval of the draft TIP from this June in order to add 100 more projects through streamlining, cash management, and project acceleration. He noted that some unfunded projects would advance into years 6, 7, 8 and 9, and projects in those years may advance to the committed category. He added that a reset schedule should be available by the end of the month.

Mr. Trogdon stated although the General Assembly approved bonds for \$1.4 billion; it denied infrastructure bonds for \$2 billion due to an existing balance of \$1.7 billion committed to projects not delivered. He noted that making project delivery a priority for

two (2) years would reduce the cash balance on committed projects to under a billion dollars.

Mr. Trogdon stated that he has been tracking Division and central office projects monthly. He expressed the desire to extend the higher delivery rate from two (2) to five (5) years, and for transportation bonds to be reconsidered for unfunded requests, which are predominately at the Regional and Division levels. He added that this would focus the Garvey capacity on the Statewide tier to address projects with corridor caps and others that require substantially more investment than what can be accomplished in five (5) years. He noted that he's working closely with the General Assembly to achieve this.

Mr. Trogdon pointed out that the CAFE (Corporate Average Fuel Economy) standards are being aggressively incorporated into the vehicle fleet. He noted that two (2) years ago the average vehicle sold had 24 mpg; this year, it's 34 mpg; and by 2025, 54 mpg, which doesn't include the exponential growth of electric vehicles. He commented that this will significantly impact revenue sources in the future.

As a second priority, Mr. Trogdon expressed concerns and is preparing for a possible crisis that may occur between 2021 and 2025 involving the replacement of motor fuels revenue and reducing dependence on federal investment. He noted that the state is 50 percent dependent on motor fuels and the federal government, 70 percent. He pointed out that transfers from the (federal) general fund will no longer be available after 2021. He expressed concerns regarding the FTA (Federal Transit Administration) and the FAA (Federal Aviation Administration) with participation winding down. He commented that the FAA may focus primarily on air traffic control over CIP funding; although, planes can't land on cracked pavement or on short runways.

Mr. Trogdon pointed out that North Carolina is the ninth most populous state; and fifth highest for traffic fatalities. He expressed concerns regarding a lack of tools and partners to address behavioral drivers of that statistic (speeding, DUI/DWI, driving while distracted, leaving the roadway for no reason, etc.). He welcomed advice and volunteers to pilot impactful, and perhaps controversial ideas.

In response to an inquiry by Ms. Swearingen, Mr. Kozlosky stated that New Hanover County ranks higher in vehicular crash rate; but not in gross numbers.

Mr. Trogdon stated that his third priority is to support the state's economy by improving mobility and reducing congestion. He noted that one strategy is to break out projects from the STI that can't compete with those projects less than \$1 million to \$2 million such as the Hampstead Bypass. He noted that good legislative support exists for combining things at the Division level and from the highway fund (Mobility and Modernization). He added that additional resources may be realized following success of such a program.

A question/answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Trogdon stated that his next priority would be to continue to improve bridges and pavements across the state. Although this has improved over the last five (5) to ten (10) years, the focus on bridges needs to be redirected funds from those on secondary (10%)

roads to primary roads (68%). He noted that improvements would also be seen in appearances, such as mowing and litter control, vegetation growing around guardrail signs, and better striping for safety and visibility. A brief question/ answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Trogdon stated that the final priority is new technology. He noted that a center has been created in partnership with NC State and others partners for the use of drones or Unmanned Air Systems (UAS). He added that several years ago when the FAA was publishing the rules, no UASs were commercially registered. Now, there are a little more than 20,000, which outnumber registered aircrafts and are expected to continue to grow.

Mr. Trogdon stated that UASs are being researched for transportation purposes such as enhanced mapping, conditions assessments, disaster response, and incident management, and in partnership with other agencies such as law enforcement. He noted that rapid growth of the technology is anticipated with benefits of increased efficiency, reduced response time, and cost savings. He added that unmanned aerial systems are being researched for moving people in Europe and the UK, as well as for UPS and fast food delivery.

Mr. Trogdon commented that preparation for connected and autonomous vehicles is even more important. He stated that the Triangle Expressway is one of 10 test sites across the nation with an opportunity for familiarization and preparation of processes, policies, planning tools, and laws in order to enhance mobility.

Mr. Trogdon pointed out that significant impactors to the economy will include the Department's partnership with CSX and CCX intermodal facility, and the Ports with rail improvements such as the Carolina Queen City Express intermodal service in preparation for enhanced transatlantic/transpacific container service to/from the Ports. He commented that the next four (4) years will set the tone for competing interests nationally. Although transportation is a small part of the national budget, it's critical to all states, increasing the importance of being poised to leverage projects such as the President's infrastructure proposal.

A lengthy question/answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Trogdon expressed appreciation to the Board.

Mr. Doetsch expressed concerns regarding the impact to attendance caused by a conflicting meeting to address water quality.

### 3. Adjournment:

With no other business, the meeting adjourned at 3:58 p.m.

### 1. Call to Order

Mr. Doetsch called the meeting to order at 3:04 p.m.

### 2. Conflict of Interest Reminder

Mr. Doetsch asked if any members had a conflict of interest with any items on the meeting agenda. No members reported having a conflict of interest.

### 3. Approval of Board Members' Excused Absence

Mr. Kozlosky stated that Mr. Barfield, Mr. Rivenbark, Mr. Miller and Mr. Zimmer requested to be excused from today's meeting.

Mr. Watkins and Mr. Piepmeyer expressed concerns regarding Mr. Zimmer's and/or Mr. McComas' inability to attend due a persistent scheduling conflict.

Mr. Kozlosky pointed out that the NC Board of Transportation regularly meets the first Wednesday of the month with the exception of the last two months. He indicated that he would discuss these concerns with Mr. Zimmer.

In response to an inquiry by Ms. Batleman, Mr. Kozlosky stated that Mayor Willis had indicated that he would be present today.

Mr. Piepmeyer made a motion to excuse the absence of Mr. Barfield, Mr. Rivenbark, Mr. Miller and Mr. Zimmer. Mr. Williams seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

Mr. Williams and Mr. Doetsch acknowledged the presence of a new member.

Ms. Donna Schardien, Town of Belville, introduced herself and acknowledged the presence of her alternate, Ms. Noreen Slattery.

In response to an inquiry by Mr. Doetsch, Ms. Schardien stated that she would submit the appropriate ethics documents prior to actively participating on the Board.

### 4. Approval of Agenda

Mr. Kozlosky requested to add two (2) items to the agenda – a potential bylaw amendment, and MPO staffing. He noted that Ms. Padgett has been delayed and requested to move the presentation on the Rail Realignment Feasibility Study to later in the agenda. He acknowledged the presence of the consultant, Mr. Wayne Hyatt of Moffatt & Nichol.

Mr. Williams made a motion to approve the agenda as amended, seconded by Mr. Anderson, and the motion carried unanimously.

### 5. Public Comment Period

No public comment speakers were present.

### 6. Consent Agenda

### a. Approval of WMPO Board Meeting Minutes

The minutes for the May 31, 2017 meeting were approved unanimously.

- b. Resolution supporting the submittal of Ferry and Waterway Projects for Prioritization 5.0
- c. Resolution requesting the North Carolina Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles update the North Carolina Driver's Handbook for bicycle and pedestrian safety

Ms. Swearingen made the motion to approve Consent Agenda Items 7a through 7c.

Ms. Batleman seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

### 7. Regular Agenda

a. Resolution supporting the submittal of Bike/Pedestrian Projects for Prioritization 5.0 Ms. Doliboa told members that this is the same list that was presented for discussion at the Board's May 31, 2017 meeting. She stated that no changes have been made. She noted that staff recommends moving forward with the list as is.

Mr. Watkins made the motion to approve the Resolution supporting the submittal of Bike/Pedestrian Projects for Prioritization 5.0. Mr. Watkins seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

### b. Resolution supporting the submittal of Highway Projects for Prioritization 5.0

Ms. Motsinger told members that this item is similar to the one considered for discussion during the Board's May 31, 2017 meeting. She noted that a few of the projects were submitted twice in different formats, and one (the widening of NC 133) was split into two phases. She attributed the modifications to suggestions by NCDOT's Strategic Prioritization of Transportation Office Group to achieve higher scoring and increase the likelihood of funding during the prioritization process.

Ms. Batleman and Mr. Williams expressed concerns regarding the beginning and ending points for the NC 133 widening at Westport Drive (Projects #14 and #15), and requested a change to Jackeys Creek to minimize traffic impacts.

Mr. Williams pointed out that an intersection improvement or a stop light is needed with the opening of the Mallory Creek connecter to Brunswick Forest.

Mr. Kozlosky stated that conversations were held with the Town of Leland and NCDOT yesterday regarding a potential traffic signal at that location. He noted that some additional actions would be taken by the state to determine if a signal would meet warrants, which will be delayed a few months following its opening for traffic to normalize. A question/answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Williams made the motion to approve the Resolution supporting the submittal of Highway Projects for Prioritization 5.0 as amended, replacing both occurrences of Westport Drive with Jackeys Creek. Mr. Anderson seconded the motion.

In response to an inquiry by Ms. Swearingen regarding Project #R57, Mr. Kozlosky stated that the project would widen River Road to four (4) lanes.

Mr. Kozlosky reminded members that this action would submit projects for scoring and consideration for funding by NCDOT. Ms. Motsinger added that this prioritization is for the 2020-2030 STIP (State Transportation Improvement Plan).

Mr. Doetsch called the question and the motion carried unanimously.

### 8. Discussion

### a. <u>Prioritization 5.0 Public Transportation Projects</u>

Ms. Motsinger told members that the list of potential public transportation projects to be submitted for Prioritization 5.0 was compiled in coordination with Mr. Albert Eby, Director, and Ms. Megan Matheny, Deputy Director of the Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority.

Ms. Batleman expressed appreciation for the Brunswick Connector.

### 9. Presentation

## a. Rail Re-alignment Feasibility Study, Laura Padgett, Chair of Mayor's Task Force on the Rail Re-alignment

Ms. Padgett expressed appreciation and introduced Mr. Wayne Hyatt, Project Manager, Moffatt & Nichol. She commented that the Feasibility Study reveals some good news; although, the rail industry is rapidly changing and more study will be required.

Mr. Hyatt gave a summary of findings from the Rail Re-alignment Feasibility Study. He stated that the study commenced in July of 2016, and progressed through data collection and analysis for two (2) projects interdependent as one – the rail realignment and reuse of the corridor for public transit. He added that the study marks a point in time on the verge of a new U.S. administration, a new State of N.C. administration, new leadership at CSX, and a new strategic plan for the Port.

Mr. Hyatt stated that the study is comprised of a series of 12 technical reports with the study area limited to locations where the rail corridor could be placed and the existing beltline railroad (from the Hilton bridge, around to the "Y," and back around and down to the Port). He added that the study is not capable of analyzing features outside the study area to determine benefits and impacts based on a potential NEPA study – the next step in progressing to environmental and construction phases.

Mr. Hyatt stated that the presentation of the feasibility study to this body is a final phase, pending any comments from the City Council and WMPO Board that would result in revisions or comments on the report. He reported that at this phase of the study, no "fatal flaws" were found preventing either or both of the projects from moving forward. He noted that there are benefits and impacts to environmental resources and human environments; and negotiations with government agencies and private industry will be required; and marketing concerns exist. He pointed out that the National Surface Transportation Board (STB) will play a prominent role in the reuse of the existing beltway and rail realignment.

A question/answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Hyatt gave an overview of proposed alignments and areas of concern (the turning basin, Battleship, and Royal Tract). He noted that environmental impacts increase for alignments toward the west, and economic impacts increase toward the east. He added that the cost increases for an alignment across U.S. Route 74. He stated that several interviews with the Port and CSX helped define potential corridors as follows:

- **Corridor A (Western Alignment):** Starts at Yadkin Junction; crosses the Royal Tract on a former railroad right-of-way; runs just outside properties that can be improved with freight service; moveable bridge;
- **Corridor B (Central Alignment):** Further east than Corridor A; crosses further into industrial properties; crosses U.S. 74 and Cape Fear River (moveable bridge);
- Corridor C (Easternmost Alignment): Approaches, but does not cross U.S. 74; minimizes impacts to the conservation easement; impacts developable property along the roadway; uses a portion of the NCDOT right-of-way along U.S. 74; avoids the interchange and Battleship property, although some reworking of the interchange and entrance to the Battleship may be required; uses existing bridge clearance; requires a new bridge.

A question/ answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Hyatt pointed out that identifying potential funding sources will be critical to the success of the railroad realignment, which will potentially be under the FRA (Federal Railroad Administration) unless private funding is found. He noted that it will still be necessary to go through the Corps of Engineers regarding the river crossing and wetland impacts. He added that the FTA (Federal Transit Administration) will have jurisdiction over the transit portion. Although the two (2) entities are under the U.S. Department of Transportation, each has separate rules and regulations for funding, project approvals, and the safety of equipment and operations, and require specific logical termini.

Mr. Hyatt gave examples of funding sources such as the North Carolina Golden Leaf, and Port Growth. He noted that the economic greater return over 30 years totals \$291 million in undiscounted benefits based on the Port not expanding (0.22%) or \$395 million with expansion (0.67%). He gave a breakdown of benefits to quality of life, economic competitiveness, safety, state of good repair, and environmental sustainability.

Mr. Hyatt stated that project net present value uses a discount rate of three percent (3%) in 2015 dollars. He estimated cost at almost \$752 million for both projects, driven by the

large contingency factor associated with a higher level study. A question/answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Hyatt estimated the net present value for the project due to its cost at \$367.7 million without Port expansion, and \$322.4 million with Port expansion. He noted that this does not include market aspects associated with increased product transit through the Port.

Following a lengthy question/answer and discussion period, Mr. Hyatt stated that a final report would be presented with an errata sheet for any changes that need to be made resulting from comments.

Ms. Padgett reminded the Board that the task force of 11 members included Mr. Jim Van Derzee, Regional Economic Director, CSXT; Ms. Laura Blair, State Ports; Ms. Pat Batleman, WMPO; Mr. Arthur Petteway, NCDOT Rail Division, and his predecessor, Mr. Marc Hamel; Mr. Frank Williams, Chair, Brunswick County Board of Commissioners; Ms. Beth Dawson, former New Hanover County Commissioner; Dr. Earl Sheridan, Wilmington City Council; and Mr. Randy McIntyre, MCO Transport (one of the three shippers on the north end of the track). She noted that most shippers do not get a rail car a day, and are served by a CSX shuttle to Davis Yard and west.

Ms. Padgett urged acceptance of the report and commented that a partnership with CSX will be crucial. She pointed out that CSX's new CEO, Mr. E. Hunter Harrison, values innovation and tightly scheduled shipping, which may be an opportunity for other uses of the proposed short line track.

Ms. Padgett pointed out that expansion of the Port has begun, and its five (5)-year plan is being finished. She noted that the 2016 Plan excluded Enviva, Vertex, the Queen City Express, the coming intermodal facility in Rocky Mount, the Carolina Connector, and a potential connector from Columbus County. She commented that the Task Force has been in touch with private rail companies, who continue to express an interest in this project and a potential opportunity for some private funding.

Ms. Padgett stated that the next step would be to further study the engineering, and a broader-reaching marketing study to include the Pender Industrial Park and other state and regional development, such as in Columbus County. A lengthy question/answer and discussion period was held.

Mr. Kozlosky stated that the intent of today was to educate the Board as to the feasibility study. He advised that the Board consider a Resolution of support after the City considers one to accept the report and the Task Force's recommendation, potentially in August. He commented that the Board would continue to work with Ms. Padgett, who has some ideas about how to proceed.

The Board expressed appreciation to Ms. Padgett.

### 8. <u>Discussion (continued)</u>

### b. Prioritization 5.0 Aviation Projects

Ms. Kozlosky reminded members that included in the agenda packet is a memo and list of aviation projects that staff proposes to submit to NCDOT in Prioritization 5.0. He noted that staff coordinated with Wilmington International Airport. He added that the list will be brought back for adoption at the Board's next meeting.

### c. Direct Attributable Submittal Form Proposal

Ms. Kozlosky told members that during the organizational analysis and the SWOT analysis, partners expressed a desire to consolidate the application for Direct Attributable funds for both Transportation Alternatives and Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funds. He noted that staff developed a draft that was brought to the Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC) in June for discussion, with revisions to be returned to the TCC's July meeting for additional comments. He added that this Item would be brought forward for approval at the Board's July or August meeting.

### 10. Updates

Mr. Doetsch reminded the Board that updates are included in the agenda packet. He announced that the next Bike/Ped Committee meeting would be held August 20, 2017 and the next WMPO Board meeting would be held July 26, 2017.

### 9. Discussion (continued)

### d. Special Meeting for Map Act Update

In response to an inquiry by Mr. Piepmeyer, Ms. Motsinger stated that a Citizens Advisory Committee meeting would be held in July.

Mr. Kozlosky reminded the Board that it directed him to schedule a meeting with the Board's counsel regarding the Map Act cases. He noted that due to scheduling conflicts, no update has occurred. He added that the MPO has received at least one additional filing. He noted that counsel has provided several other dates of potential availability in July. He reminded the Board that its next regularly scheduled meeting is July 26, 2017.

The Board expressed concerns. A consensus of members expressed the desire for a meeting before or after the Board's next regularly scheduled meeting on July 26, 2017. Mr. Piepmeyer expressed regret that he would be unable to attend.

### e. Potential Amendment to MPO Board Bylaws

Mr. Kozlosky stated that yesterday the Town of Belville appointed Ms. Schardien and requested to know the number of alternatives that could be appointed. He pointed out that the Bylaws are not specific. He proposed to amend the Bylaws to designate a specific number and to clean up the language revising the name of the Board. He added that the State Ethics Commission indicated that numerous MPOs and RPOs specify that each member have one alternate.

A question/answer and discussion period was held.

It was the consensus of the Board that only one alternate be designated.

Mr. Kozlosky stated that a revised set of Bylaws would be brought forward for consideration at the Board's July meeting.

### f. Staffing Challenges

Mr. Kozlosky reported that three (3) resignations have been received during the course of the past few weeks; essentially eliminating the MPO's Long Range Planning section. He noted that Mr. Lopez, Ms. Doliboa, and Ms. Motsinger will be leaving in the month of July. He commented that this may delay items on the work plan. He reported that five (5) vacancies exist currently.

In response to an inquiry by Mr. Williams, Mr. Kozlosky attributed the loss to a number of different reasons including returning to practice law, relocating to Colorado, or taking a job in the private sector or New Hanover County.

- Mr. Doetsch requested a study and recommendations to help prevent future loss.
- Mr. Williams expressed appreciation to the staff who will be leaving.
- Mr. Kozlosky commented that some time will be needed to re-staff and for new staff to learn the area. A brief question/answer and discussion period was held.

### 11. Adjournment

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:58 p.m.





## RESOLUTION ACCEPTING THE WILMINGTON RAIL REALIGNMENT AND RIGHT OF WAY USE ALTERNATIVES FEASIBILITY STUDY AND SUPPORTING THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE MAYOR'S TASK FORCE TO CONTINUE DEVELOPMENT OF THE RAIL REALIGNMENT PROJECT

WHEREAS, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization provides transportation planning services for the City of Wilmington, Town of Carolina Beach, Town of Kure Beach, Town of Wrightsville Beach, Town of Belville, Town of Leland, Town of Navassa, New Hanover County, Brunswick County, Pender County, Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority and the North Carolina Board of Transportation; and

WHEREAS, the CSXT rail line originates in Brunswick County, crossing the Cape Fear River into the City of Wilmington just north of the Isabelle Holmes Bridge. The rail line then continues eastward through the City before turning south and west again-- back toward the river and the Port of Wilmington. The sweeping path of the rail line thus forms a large "U" (on its side) which, at one time, wrapped around the eastern limits of the City; and

WHEREAS, today, this same rail line passes through the heart of the City of Wilmington, resulting in thousands of motor vehicle rail crossings each day and adversely impacting the quiet enjoyment of many neighborhoods in the city; and

**WHEREAS**, the current route also impedes safe, efficient rail access to the Port of Wilmington and reduces the competitiveness of this important state-owned facility, as well as other nearby industries served by rail; and

**WHEREAS,** a potential solution would be to relocate the existing rail line to a crossing of the Cape Fear River close to the Port property, thereby eliminating rail traffic through the heart of the city, and dramatically improving rail access to the Port; and

**WHEREAS,** in addition, this proposal would provide an opportunity to convert the existing heavy rail corridor, with all of its related safety and noise issues, into a quiet transit corridor; and

**WHEREAS,** on August 18, 2015 the Mayor of the City of Wilmington appointed the Railroad Realignment Task Force to support the rail realignment effort; and

**WHEREAS,** the City of Wilmington, North Carolina Department of Transportation and Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization partnered to fund a feasibility study to investigate the feasibility of re-aligning the existing CSXT railroad line; and

**WHEREAS,** Moffat & Nichol completed the feasibility study in June 2017 that covered a number of aspects of the project across a wide spectrum of detailed areas of investigation; and

WHEREAS, the feasibility study found that there are no "fatal flaws" at this level of study; and

WHEREAS, based on the findings of the feasibility study, the Mayor's Task Force recommended to continue forward with the project.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** be it resolved that the Board of the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization hereby accepts the Wilmington Rail Realignment and Right of Way Use Alternatives Feasibility Study and supports the recommendation of the Mayor's Task Force to continue development of the Rail Realignment project.

On September 25, 2013 the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (WMPO) Transportation Advisory Committee passed a resolution supporting the allocation of Transportation Alternatives Program – Direct Attributable (TAP-DA) funds for the City of Wilmington MCO project. A contract in the amount of \$222,152 was then executed with NCDOT on May 8<sup>th</sup>, 2014 for the design and construction of the 0.26 mile multi-use path along Military Cutoff Road (SR 1409) between Eastwood Road and Drysdale Road.

The City of Wilmington had started design work the consulting engineer to identify layout alternatives and ROW needs for the MCO project. However, the upcoming NCDOT intersection improvements at Eastwood and Military Cutoff Road in the near future (TIP U-5710), is expected to overlap the proposed alignment of the multi-use path project.

Given the proximity of construction and the advancing schedule of the NCDOT project, the City, NCDOT and WMPO are in agreement to transfer the MCO project to NCDOT for incorporation into their project. Based on this information the City respectfully requests that the TIP be amended to remove funding for the project. The City acknowledges responsibility to repay all funds reimbursed to date through the contract with NCDOT.

## RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE NORTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION REMOVE THE WESTGATE MULTI-USE PATH (U-5534P) FROM THE STATE/METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMS

WHEREAS, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization provides transportation planning services for the City of Wilmington, Town of Carolina Beach, Town of Kure Beach, Town of Wrightsville Beach, Town of Belville, Town of Leland, Town of Navassa, New Hanover County, Brunswick County, Pender County, Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority and the North Carolina Board of Transportation; and

**WHEREAS,** on January 28, 2015 the Town of Leland was awarded Surface Transportation Program-Direct Attributable (TAP-DA) funding in the amount of \$96,172 for the Westgate Multi-use Path Project; and

**WHEREAS**, the funds were to be utilized to design multi-use path from Westgate Drive to Ricegate Drive; and

**WHEREAS**, the State/Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Programs were amended to include the multi-use path as TIP Project U-55434P; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Leland has determined that the Town is not prepared to move forward with the design of the Westgate Multi-use path for the foreseeable future and consequently will not be able to complete the work outlined in the agreement; and

**NOW THEREFORE,** be it resolved that the Board of the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization hereby requests the North Carolina Department of Transportation remove the Westgate Multi-use path (Project U-5534P) from the State/Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Programs.

## **BYLAWS**

## WILMINGTON URBAN AREA METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION BOARD TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

## ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Wilmington Urban Area <u>Metropolitan Planning Organization BoardTransportation Advisory Committee</u>, hereinafter referred to as the "<u>BoardTAC</u>".

## **ARTICLE II – PURPOSE**

The purposes of the <u>Board TAC</u> are outlined in the most recent "Memorandum of Understanding" approved by the appropriate local governments.

## ARTICLE III – MEMBERS

<u>Section I – Number of Qualifications</u>: The <u>Board TAC</u> shall consist as specified in the "Memorandum of Understanding". The eligible voting member list consists of a representative from each of the appropriate boards with the City of Wilmington having two representatives.

<u>Section II – Terms of Office</u>: All elected representatives serving on the <u>Board TAC</u> may serve for the length of their elected terms. A member may serve successive terms.

Section III – Alternates: Each of the member appropriate boards shall designate appoint one (1) Alternate provided each Alternate also meets the same qualifications of membership. all members of their governing board who are not members of the TAC as alternate members of the TAC. In the event that a member is unable to attend, that member or the chief elected officer of that jurisdiction will designate an alternate to attend and participate in the member's absence. That The Aalternate member willmay serve as a full voting member during any meeting where the one of that board's representative(s) is not in attendance. Proxy and absentee voting are not permitted.

## ARTICLE IV – OFFICERS

<u>Section I – Officers Defined</u>: The <u>BoardTAC</u> shall, upon majority vote of its membership, appoint one voting member of the Committee to act as Chairman and one voting member to act as Vice-Chairman. A member of the

staff of the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization will serve as Secretary to the Committee.

<u>Section II – Duties</u>: The Chairman shall call and preside at meetings and appoint committees. In absence of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall preside and complete all duties of the Chairman.

<u>Section III – Elections</u>: The Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall be elected annually by the voting members of the <u>BoardTAC</u>, with their terms to begin at that meeting. In the event that there is no Chairman or Vice-Chairman, the TCC Chairman shall preside until a Chairman and Vice-Chairman are elected. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall serve for a period of one (1) year from their election and may be re-elected.

## **ARTICLE V - MEETINGS**

Section I – Meetings: Regular schedules will be adopted by the BoardTAC at the last first meeting of the calendar year. If there is insufficient reason for a regularly scheduled meeting, as determined by the Chairman, the Secretary will notify BoardTAC members of the meeting's cancellation. Meetings shall be conducted under parliamentary procedures consistent with Robert's Rules of Order.

A Special or Emergency meeting is a separate session of society held at a time different from that of a regular meeting, and convened only to consider one or more items of business specified in the call of the meeting. Notice of the time, place and exact purpose of the meeting must be mailed to all members a reasonable number of days in advance. The reason for the special or emergency meeting is to deal with important matters that may arise between regular meetings and that urgently require action by the society before the next regular meeting. As in the case of a regular meeting, the session of a special or emergency meeting in an ordinary society is normally concluded in a single meeting, unless the assembly at the special meeting schedules an adjourned meeting.

<u>Special Meetings</u> – The Chairman or a majority of board members may at any time call a special meeting of the <u>BoardCommittee</u> by signing a notice stating the time and place of the meeting and the subjects to be discussed. The person or persons calling the meeting shall cause the notice to be posted at City Hall in downtown Wilmington or the door of the regular meeting place at least forty-eight hours before the meeting. In addition, the notice shall be e-mailed or mailed to individuals and news organizations. Only items of business specified in the notice may be transacted at a special meeting.

<u>Emergency Meetings</u>- If a special meeting is called to deal with an unexpected circumstance requiring immediate consideration, the notice requirements of this

rule do not apply. However, the person or persons calling an emergency meeting shall take responsible action to inform the other board members and the public of the meeting. Local news organizations having requested notice of the special meetings shall be notified of such emergency meetings by the same method used to notify the board members. Only business connected to the emergency may be discussed at this meeting.

Section II- <u>Board TAC</u> Sub-Committees: The <u>Board Transportation Advisory</u> <u>Committee</u>-may create Sub-Committees to assist with forwarding the mission and goals of the Wilmington MPO. These Sub-Committees shall be created by a formal vote of the <u>Board Transportation Advisory Committee</u>. The notice of Sub-Committee meetings shall be posted at City Hall in downtown Wilmington or the door of the regular meeting place at least forty-eight hours before the meeting. In addition, the notice shall be e-mailed or mailed to all <u>Board Transportation</u> <u>Advisory Committee</u>-members and news organizations.

<u>Section III– Quorums and Majority Vote:</u> A quorum is required for the transaction of all business, including conducting meetings or hearings, participating in deliberations or voting upon or otherwise transacting public business. A quorum consists of 51% of the members of the <u>BoardTAC</u>, plus as many additional members as may be required to ensure that 51% of the possible votes are present.

Section IV- Attendance: Each member shall be expected to attend each scheduled meeting. Any Board member asking to be excused shall require a call to the MPO's Executive Director at least 24 hours in advance of the meeting. The Executive Director will at the beginning of the Board meeting, list the members requesting to be excused which will require a vote from the Board to approve these excused absences. If an Alternate attends a meeting in place of the member, this will not count as an absence for the member. For members not attending three (3) consecutive <a href="Board TAC">Board TAC</a> meetings, the Chairman will send to the chief elected officer of the jurisdiction of the member in question, a letter indicating the number of absences and requesting re-affirmation or redesignation of the jurisdiction's representative.

## <u>ARTICLE VI – VOTING PROCEDURES</u>

<u>Section I – Majority Votes</u>: Any member may call for a vote on any issue provided that it is seconded and within the purposes set forth in the "Memorandum of Understanding." Each voting member of the <u>BoardTAC</u> shall have one vote, and a majority vote of those present and voting shall constitute approval of any motion, provided a quorum exists. Abstentions are not included in the tally of the votes. Proxy and absentee voting are not permitted.

<u>Section II – Agenda</u>: The agenda is the list of items suggested for discussion at a <u>Board</u><del>TAC</del> meeting. Agenda items originate <u>from the Executive</u>

<u>Director or</u> as a carry-over from previous meetings, are placed on the agenda prior to its distribution by any member of the <u>BoardTAC</u>, by request from any jurisdiction party to the "Memorandum of Understanding," or by the request of a member of the Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC). TCC and <u>BoardTAC</u> members may submit an item(s) to their respective TCC and <u>BoardTAC</u> agendas. In order for a Board member to submit an item(s) to the TCC or <u>BoardTAC</u>, the item(s) must be submitted no later than 5:00 p.m. the first business day of the calendar month in which the item is requested to be considered. The item must include all pertinent background materials (resolution, maps, etc.). The <u>BoardTAC</u> shall approve the agenda at the beginning of each meeting. At this time, the <u>BoardTAC</u> shall have the ability to add or remove any item on the agenda by a super-majority vote of the <u>Board'sTAC's</u> voting members present. An item added to the agenda will be placed for consideration at the end of the meeting.

### ARTICLE VII – AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

Amendments to these Bylaws of the <u>BoardTAC</u> shall require the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds (2/3) of the eligible voting members, provided that written notice of the proposed amendment has been received by each member at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting at which the item is to be considered and provided that such amendment does not conflict with the letter or the fundamental intent of the "Memorandum of Understanding" governing this document. In the event of any conflict, the "Memorandum of Understanding" shall carry precedence over these Bylaws.



#### **Project Description**

The Cape Fear Crossing project is proposed as a roadway extending from the vicinity of US 17 Bypass and I-140 in Brunswick County to US 421 in New Hanover County, including a crossing of the Cape Fear River. The project is programmed in the approved 2016-2025 and draft 2017-2027 STIP for planning and environmental studies only using STPDA funding from the Wilmington MPO.

#### **Current and Upcoming Activities**

- The project team continues to coordinate and correspond with project stakeholders.
- Studies for the Traffic Noise Analysis and Air Quality Analysis are ongoing.
- An update to the Draft Natural Resources Technical Report is ongoing.
- The Draft Sea Level Rise Assessment is under review by NCDOT.
- Right-of-Way cost estimates and relocation reports have been initiated.
- Preparation of the Draft Environmental Impact Statement has been initiated.
- The project team will follow up with the NEPA/Section 404 Merger Team regarding potential elimination of alternatives and concurrence on bridging decisions after Concurrence Point 2A.
- Designs for alternatives south of the Port of Wilmington are being revised to provide 215 feet of vertical clearance over the Cape Fear River navigational channel (versus 187 feet currently designed), as requested by the WMPO and the NCSPA.

# WILMINGTON MPO TRANSPORTATION PLANNING JULY 2017

#### **17TH STREET STREETSCAPE**

**Project Descriptions/Scope:** The 17th Street streetscape project will include upgrades to 17th Street between Wrightsville Avenue and Princess Place Drive. The project will provide for a more efficient transportation system by reduced travel speeds, removal of the lateral shift, improved pedestrian crossings, improved safety and enhance the aesthetics of the area. The City awarded the construction contract to Lanier Construction on June 21st. Construction began on August 22nd. Construction is ongoing and anticipated to be complete in August.

#### **GULCH GREENWAY MASTER PLAN**

**Project Description/Scope:** Create a master plan to guide the development of a section of trail located in the former railroad bed between 3rd and McRae Streets in downtown Wilmington. This section of trail is identified in the Wilmington/New Hanover County Comprehensive Greenway Plan as part of the top-ranked "Downtown Trail". A lease for the right-of-way for this section of future trail has been authorized through SB174. The master plan will utilize broad community and stakeholder engagement to lay out a conceptual design towards successful funding and construction of this project. This plan is being created through a joint effort between the Wilmington MPO, NCDOT, City of Wilmington, and the Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority.

#### **Next Steps:**

• This effort will be rolled into the Heart of Wilmington Plan

#### **LELAND STREET DESIGN STANDARDS MANUAL**

**Project Description/Scope:** The Town of Leland is partnering with the Wilmington Urban Area MPO to utilize consultant services for the development of street design guidelines. These guidelines will guide new development towards the construction of streets that better align with the town's values in terms of connectivity, multi-modal activity, maintenance, design, and safety. The Leland Street Design Guidelines will include the provision of conceptual tables/graphics which will more easily convey the impact of standards on the physical landscape to the public and elected officials.

#### TRANSPORTATION DEMAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

**Project Description/Scope:** UNCW is taking the role as lead employer for the Cape Fear region. The WMPO will coordinate with UNCW to work with other major employers in the region to identify opportunities for public outreach, marketing, carpooling, vanpooling, alternative/compressed work schedules, Emergency Guaranteed Ride Home, park and ride lots, etc. The MPO established 2 park and ride lots in Brunswick County and a ridesharing program that began on January 5, 2015. The MPO adopted "Work Cape Fear: Expanding Commuter Options in the Cape Fear Region" TDM Short Range Plan on January 28, 2015 and also authorized staff to apply for a TDM grant through NCDOT that if approved would fund a full-time TDM Coordinator position. The Agreement with NCDOT for the full-time TDM Coordinator position was approved on November 4, 2015. The Wilmington MPO has hired a full-time TDM Coordinator. Pulsar is continuing to develop branding materials and a marketing plan for the Go Coast.

- Continue regularly scheduled Go Coast Committee meetings
- Begin development of the Go Coast marketing plan
- Finalize TDM program name and branding materials
- Schedule lunch and learns with area employers to promote Go Coast program
- Partner with large employers to determine vanpool options
- Partner with K-12 schools in WMPO jurisdiction to provide carpool opportunities to parents
- Partner with UNCW, Cape Fear Community College, and New Hanover Regional Medical Center to explore carpool matching options and guaranteed ride home strategies
- Coordinate with employers to implement 2 additional vanpool programs and potential Park & Ride lot locations

- Coordinate bike share presentations for interested employers

# Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority Project Update July 2017

#### REGIONAL AUTHORITY PROJECTS

- 1. Bus fleet replacement identifying state and federal funding opportunities to replace eleven thirty-five foot buses, two trolleys, and three shuttles. The Authority has applied for funding from a nationwide discretionary grant program from Federal Transit and is following other opportunities.
  - Two replacement shuttle vehicles were delivered in March 2017. Three replacement shuttle vehicles were approved by the Authority in April. Seven replacement paratransit vehicles have been approved for funding. The paratransit vehicles will be ordered throughout the summer for delivery in the fall of 2017.
- 2. Short Range Transportation Plan following adoption of Cape Fear Transportation 2040 by the Wilmington Metropolitan Planning Organization (WMPO), Wave Transit has begun its latest short range plan. The plan will set a course for public transportation initiatives, route structure, and revenue programming for the next five years. The plan will also include a financial element to ensure that transit programs are compliant with FTA rules and regulations.
  - Under the direction of the Authority's Operations and Planning Committee made up of funding partners, Board members, staff, WMPO board members, WMPO staff, passengers, interested citizens, and professional transit planning consultants, the 9 12 month plan is an important tool in identifying and quantifying the public transportation needs of the community. Marketing, public relations, and community support for financing transit in Southeastern North Carolina will also be a focus of the plan. A key component of the plan will be extensive surveying and data collection to assess the needs of current and prospective passengers. Nelson Nygaard is the principal consultant leading the project.
  - Data collection has begun and is being analyzed. Over fifteen agencies have agreed to assist Wave Transit as stakeholders in the planning effort. The stakeholder committee has been identified and held their inaugural meeting. The project is expected to be completed in the spring of 2018.
- 3. Long Term Funding (no significant change) currently, the Authority does not have a dedicated source of local funding. Strategies to meet future revenue requirements will be identified during SRTP development. The Authority has drafted a *Short Range Finical Plan* which was adopted on January 26, 2017. The financial plan findings will be reviewed by the SRTP consultant and included in the final plan. A study regarding long term funding for transit in the region has been requested by the City of Wilmington and New Hanover County. The request will be included as part of the upcoming short range planning effort.
- **4. Shelter Program** (no significant change) a program to replace and add up to 50 bus shelters and 25 benches at bus stops is underway. Construction of the first eight

shelters is complete. Phase two, consisting of 12 shelters and 15 benches has been designed and construction bidding is being prepared. Phase three consisting of three super stops at Independence Mall, Hanover Center, and Monkey Junction is in the engineering and permitting phase.

#### WMPO SPONSORED PROJECTS

- **1. Pleasure Island Special Appropriation** an STBGP-DA transfer was approved by the WMPO in 2016 for \$75,000 to support Wave Transit route 301. The grant has been finalized and funds are expected to be drawn in the current quarter.
- 2. Wilmington Multimodal Transportation Center An Interlocal Agreement between Authority, City of Wilmington, WMPO, and NCDOT has been executed. Demolition of the U-Haul building is complete. Thanks to generous support from the WMPO, STP-DA funding in the amount of \$2,400,000 has been flexed by FHWA to FTA for the project and a formal grant with FTA has approved.
  Hazardous materials abatement and demolition are nearing completion. Stabilization design is complete and an Invitation for Bid was let on June 09, 2017. Stabilization is expected to take two to three months to complete. Bids are due July 10, 2017 and award is expected on July 27, 2017. Upon completion of stabilization, renovation will commence with an expected facility dedication to take place in the spring of 2018.
- 3. Preventive Maintenance & ADA STP-DA funding in the amount of \$351,000 for preventive maintenance and ADA service throughout the region was approved by the WMPO in 2016. The process of flexing the funds from FHWA to FTA is underway and expected to be complete in the second quarter of calendar 2017. The funds will assist the Authority in maintaining its fleet of fixed route buses and FTA funded facilities to meet the FTA *State of Good Repair Requirement*. The preventive maintenance funding will ensure that Wave Transit vehicles are safe, reliable, and provide a positive and comfortable experience on Wave Transit routes throughout the region. The allocation does not represent all PM funding to the Authority but will serve to supplement current federal funding.
  - Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance utilized under the funding will be used to offset the cost of providing complementary ADA service for passengers unable to access Wave Transit fixed routes. Paratransit services provided under the WMPO authorized funding include specialized origin to destination van service. In May 2017 the Authority provided 1,822 ADA passenger trips. The period of performance for the project is 07/01/2016 through 06/30/2017.
- **4. Preventive Maintenance & ADA** (no change) STBGP-DA funding in the amount of \$510,778 for preventive maintenance and ADA service throughout the region was approved by the WMPO in 2016. The process of flexing the funds from FHWA to FTA is in process. The funds will assist the Authority in maintaining its fleet of fixed route buses and FTA funded facilities to meet the FTA *State of Good Repair Requirement*. The preventive maintenance funding will ensure that Wave Transit vehicles are safe, reliable, and provide a positive and comfortable experience on Wave Transit routes throughout the region.

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance utilized under the funding will be used to offset the cost of providing complementary ADA service for passengers unable to access Wave Transit fixed routes. Paratransit services provided under the WMPO authorized funding include specialized origin to destination van service. The period of performance for the project is 07/01/2017 through 06/30/2018.

5. Replacement CNG Buses - In February 2017 the WMPO appropriated \$372,000 in FHWA funding for two replacement CNG buses. The Authority has a contract for the vehicles with Gillig, LLC. Final pricing pursuant to the PPI provisions of the contract have been determined and a purchase order for the buses is expected to be considered by the Authority on June 22, 2017. Local matching funds have been identified. Pursuant to the contract, delivery is scheduled within 365 days of issuance of a purchase order. The Authority is awaiting the STPGP-DA transfer letter from NCDOT to issue the purchase order.
