1. Call to Order

Mr. Kozlosky called the meeting to order at 10:03 am.

2. Approval of Minutes

The motion to approve the minutes for the June 16, 2010 meeting carried unanimously.

3. Old Business

No items

4. New Business

a. Resolution Supporting Corridor Preservation of the Cape Fear Skyway

Mr. Kozlosky told members at the last TAC meeting, Mayor Futch indicated that since the resolution adopted in October of 2009 by the TAC provided for a 6-month time frame for the preparation of the map and the filing of the corridor, the TAC should not be discussing it at that meeting. Mr. Kozlosky said he had placed the item on their agenda so TAC members might review the recently received corridor maps. Chairman Barfield then requested that staff bring a resolution back to the next meeting to extend that time frame. Mr. Kozlosky stated that staff prepared a resolution that does not implement a time frame, but acknowledges that the time frame set by the TAC was not met and the resolution also encourages New Hanover County, Brunswick County, the City of Wilmington and the Town of Leland to utilize the statute available to file a corridor map for the Cape Fear Skyway.

Mr. Burgess made the motion to support the resolution and forward to the TAC for consideration.

Mr. Owens seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

b. Resolution Supporting HUD Sustainability Grant

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Mr. Kozlosky told members HUD has released a planning grant opportunity for \$100 million to complete a sustainability plan. The County has assembled a consortium made up of people from the housing and transportation interest throughout the community. Representatives are from Pender County, New Hanover County, Brunswick County, the City of Wilmington's Community Development, and the Cape Fear Public Utility Authority. Each participating organization has been asked to endorse a resolution acknowledging and agreeing to provide support and participation on the committee. The resolution authorizes the Executive Director to direct staff resources to assist in the sustainability plan development under the lead of Cape Fear Regional Community Development Council (CFRCDC) upon awarding of the grant.

Ms Ayers made the motion to support the resolution and forward to the TAC for consideration. Mr. Eggert seconded the motion.

Mr. Kozlosky told members the grant application is due August 23rd. The committee is requesting about \$1 million to complete the planning effort. If the grant is awarded to the community, details will be worked out.

Mr. Eggert told members the municipalities have not been involved to any extent thus far. If the grant is awarded, the municipalities will be included to make it a successful endeavor.

Mr. Kozlosky said from a transportation standpoint, staff had envisioned taking Cape Fear Commutes 2035 Long Range Plan and the comprehensive plan that was developed for Brunswick County, and potentially provide some funding to continue to develop the comprehensive transportation plan for Pender County and try to roll it all into one vision for the region.

Mr. Eby asked if funding would be used to hire a consultant. Mr. Eggert told members when the group last met they discussed hiring a consultant to do most the work because no one in the community has the expertise to hit the ground running. Mr. Kozlosky said it would also allow the CFRCDC to hire staff members. He stated that New Hanover County and the Cape Fear Regional Community Development Council are the ones spearheading the effort to receive the grant.

Ms Ayers asked Mr. Kozlosky if the resolution was just giving him permission to allocate staff resources to work on this effort. Mr. Kozlosky said yes.

Mr. Kozlosky called for the vote on the motion and it carried unanimously.

c. Resolution Amending the Fiscal Year 2010-2011 Unified Planning Work Program of the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization

Mr. Kozlosky told members the Senate had passed a bill containing a \$2.2 billion reduction in highway contracting authority. The Department released information yesterday on how they are planning on trying to assess the situation. The MPO has \$69,203 in the unobligated fund balance. Staff proposes a budget amendment to move those funds to the management and operations line item, then those funds could not be rescinded. If we decide not to use those funds, we could come back with a budget adjustment prior to March to move the funds or de-obligate those funds. Ms. Stark told members a lot of the MPOs are prioritizing some of local area projects and you must be able to justify what that money is being used for.

Ms. Bunch made the motion to support to resolution to approve the amendments to the fiscal year 2010-2011 Unified Planning Work Program and forward to the TAC for consideration. Mr. Eby seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

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5. Discussion

a. Wilmington MPO Draft Ethics Policy

Mr. Kozlosky told members that Mayor Futch from the Town of Leland requested that the MPO develop an ethics policy. Texas is the only state who has an ethics policy in place for MPOs. Staff reviewed the Texas policy and incorporated that into a draft proposal. Mr. Kozlosky suggested that the ethics policy be incorporated as part of the bylaws.

Mr. Kozlosky said he would like the TCC to review the draft policy and suggest improvements or changes to be incorporated. Mr. Pope told members that the Board of Transportation has an extensive ethics policy that might help serve as a model for the MPO. Mr. Owens said the state of North Carolina requires municipal boards to participate in ethics training and that may help as a model for this policy.

Mr. Mello told members he has concerns that all board members are already under an ethics policy and we need to be careful that this ethics policy does not conflict with the one that members already have in place. Mr. Mello pointed that the draft policy included MPO staff and they already operate under the City of Wilmington's ethics policy. Mr. Mello said we need clarification especially regarding any conflict of interest. Mr. Pope suggested that the policy would only be for the TAC board members. Ms. Stark suggested that the policy state that MPO staff is already under the City of Wilmington's ethic policy.

Ms. Ayers suggested that members of the TCC who have an ethics policy could forward it to Mr. Kozlosky.

b. NCDOT Work Plan and Draft STIP

Mr. Kozlosky told members the NCDOT Work Plan and Draft STIP were released by the Department at the Board of Transportation meeting earlier in the month. The Department will provide an opportunity for public comment on the draft STIP in January of 2011 and the final STIP will be adopted in July.

c. North Carolina Mobility Fund

Mr. Kozlosky told members the North Caroling Mobility Fund was approved by the Legislature in the last session. The Mobility Fund's first project will be Phase II of the Yadkin River Bridge. However, the Department of Transportation is going to be developing criteria and a project selection process for projects to be included in the Mobility Fund. This is not just for highway projects, but all modes of transportation. Mr. Kozlosky said in talking with Susan Coward in the Secretary's Office yesterday, he believes they will be using a work group that has been developed for the Strategic Prioritization Process – Version 2.0 to review the comments they receive. They are on a tight time frame and must have the final report prepared by December 15th for the joint Legislature Oversight Committee.

Mr. Kozlosky said the Department will be receiving comments from August 9th to September 9th. The work group will take the comments and develop a preliminary report by the end of September. They will release the report by the beginning of October and request the second round of public input. They plan to present the final report to the Board of Transportation on December 2nd. They will present that final report to joint Legislature Oversight Committee on December 15th. Mr. Kozlosky told members they could submit their comments by going through the Departments website or email comments directly to Don Voelker.

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6. Updates

a. Wilmington MPO/City of Wilmington

Mr. Don Bennett updated members on the New Center Drive roadway project. He said the final layer of pavement is down and they will be striping this week with the signal modification put in and he hopes to have the project open by the end of the week.

Mr. Bennett told members 9 of the 13 Safelight locations are nearly complete. They will be enforcing right turns on red because they now have the capability to prove if a vehicle has stopped during the course of the right turn.

b. Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority

Mr. Eby told member they received concurrence from FTA on their environmental document for the operation and maintenance facility on Division Drive. They let a contract last week for design and engineering with TransSystems and the design should be finished within 6 to 9 months. The Wave Station is still on target to open by the end of the year.

Mr. Kozlosky said the DOT has hired a consultant to complete the environmental document for the Multi-modal Transportation Center. They anticipate having the document complete within a year. They will be here the end of August to discuss the project.

c. NCDOT Project Update

Mr. Riddle updated members on the projects for NCDOT. Mr. Kozlosky asked when the Department expected competition on the Wrightsville Avenue project. Mr. Riddle said he spoke to the contractor and work is nearly finished. Mr. Pope told members the project has had some delays due to the deep tie-ins with the water and sewer. Mr. Pope said he anticipated the project wrapping up around Labor Day. Mr. Eby suggested that if there are going to be any more total road closures, it would be very helpful to have directional signs in place.

RESOLUTION ENCOURGAGING THE CONSIDERATION OF PEDESTRIAN AND BICYCLE ACCOMODATIONS ON THE CAPE FEAR RIVER SKYWAY BRIDGE

WHEREAS, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization provides transportation planning services for the City of Wilmington, Town of Carolina Beach, Town of Kure Beach, Town of Wrightsville Beach, Town of Belville, Town of Leland, Town of Navassa, New Hanover County, Brunswick County, Pender County, Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority and the N.C. Board of Transportation; and

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Turnpike Authority is in the early planning stages for the Cape Fear Skyway Bridge to provide a needed connection over the Cape Fear River between New Hanover and Brunswick County, and

WHEREAS, bicycle and pedestrian facilities as an alternative means of transportation in the Wilmington Urban Area are desired by local residents to connect neighborhoods, schools, parks and regional attractions; and

WHEREAS, the 2030 Long Range Transportation Plan called for an increase in safety and security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users, as well as an increase in accessibility and mobility options available to people, and a transportation system that promotes energy conservation and improve the overall quality of life; the integration and connectivity of the transportation system for people; and

WHEREAS, the 2035 Cape Fear Commutes Vision Statement for Cape Fear Commutes 2035 Transportation Plan is to provide a Transportation Plan for a safe, efficient, appropriate, responsible, integrated, multi-modal transportation system throughout the Wilmington Urban Area over the next 25 years; and

WHEREAS, the Wilmington MPO BikePed Committee was created to advise the Wilmington MPO on ways to promote the use of bicycling and walking for transportation, development of safe bicycle and pedestrian facilities, facilitate projects, plans, programs, and ideas that promote a safer environment for bicycling and walking in the Wilmington MPO planning area; and

WHEREAS, the Cape Fear Skyway is in the early planning phase and incorporation of pedestrian and bicycle facilities into the design of the bridge will address many of the goals outlined in the 2030 and 2035 Long Range Transportation Plans and Wilmington MPO BikePed Committee goals to provide a safe alternative to the automobile, making the Cape Fear Skyway Bridge a truly multi-modal facility that will provide bike and pedestrian connections to the Wilmington Cross City Trail, East Coast Greenway, and planned bike and pedestrian facilities in Brunswick County and in the Town of Leland.

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization's Transportation Advisory Committee encourages the North Carolina Turnpike Authority to consider pedestrian and bicycle facilities in the design of the Cape Fear Skyway Bridge.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING AIRLIE ROAD TO BE CONSIDERED FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA SCENIC BYWAY DESIGNATION

WHEREAS, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization provides transportation planning services for the City of Wilmington, Town of Carolina Beach, Town of Kure Beach, Town of Wrightsville Beach, Town of Belville, Town of Leland, Town of Navassa, New Hanover County, Brunswick County, Pender County, Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority and the N.C. Board of Transportation; and

WHEREAS, the scenic byway designation recognizes roadways for their archeological, cultural, historic, natural recreational and/or scenic qualities; and

WHEREAS, Airlie Road exhibits several of these intrinsic qualities; and

WHEREAS, Airlie Road is a picturesque route from beginning to end nestled between Bradley Creek and the Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway in Wilmington, North Carolina; and

WHEREAS, Airlie Road's scenic qualities are embodied in the natural surroundings and diverse architectural character; and

WHEREAS, the Wilmington Metropolitan Planning Organization is interested in designating Airlie Road in the City of Wilmington and New Hanover County as a scenic byway; and

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization's Transportation Advisory Committee supports the consideration of Airlie Road in Wilmington, New Hanover County for the North Carolina Scenic Byway designation.

CAPE FEAR COMMUTES 2035 TRANSPORTATION PLAN

Project Description/Scope: Cape Fear Commutes 2035 is a federally-mandated assessment of the current and future transportation needs of people and goods within the Wilmington MPO area. Cape Fear Commutes 2035 will create a long range transportation plan with recommendations for how those needs should be addressed over the next 25 years. The plan will establish the goals and objectives for the improvement of mobility within the Wilmington MPO planning area and make specific recommendations for transportation projects and funding sources.

Current Status: The MPO committee charged with crafting the Cape Fear Commutes 2035 Transportation Plan has finalized the draft plan. The plan was presented to the WMPO Transportation Advisory Committee and local member jurisdictions and held three public informational workshops. The public comment period closed on June 4th. The MPO has received and reviewed the comments. Staff met with the Citizen Advisory Committee on August 18th to review and discuss the comments.

Next Step: The MPO will incorporate the comments into the final plan. Staff plans to present the final plan to the TAC in September/October.

CAPE FEAR SKYWAY

Project Description/Scope: Construct the Cape Fear Skyway that will link from in the vicinity of US 17 to Independence Boulevard and Carolina Beach Road.

Current Status: On October 28, 2009 the Wilmington MPO's Transportation Advisory Committee endorsed a resolution supporting the northern alignment and encouraging New Hanover County, City of Wilmington, Brunswick County and the Town of Leland to utilize the land use planning tools available to preserve a corridor for the future Cape Fear Skyway. The North Carolina Turnpike Authority provided the finalized the Transportation Corridor Official map for the Cape Fear Skyway on June 9th. On August 18th the maps were presented to the Wilmington MPO's Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC). The TAC endorsed a resolution that encourages New Hanover County, City of Wilmington, Brunswick County and Town of Leland to utilize North Carolina General Statute 136-44.50 to file a transportation corridor official map for the Cape Fear Skyway.

The City of Wilmington, New Hanover County, Pender County, Town of Carolina Beach and Town of Wrightsville Beach have endorsed resolutions supporting the "gap" funding and corridor preservation. Senator Boseman introduced Senate Bill 1129 and Representative McComas introduced House Bill 2053 that would provide "gap"funding for the Cape Fear Skyway. The bills have been referred to committee and no action was taken on the bills during the Legislature's short session.

Next Step: Work with New Hanover and Brunswick counties, Town of Leland and City of Wilmington to preserve a corridor for the future Cape Fear Skyway from Independence Boulevard/Carolina Beach Road intersection to a location in the vicinity of US 17 and the Wilmington Bypass in Brunswick County. Work with North Carolina delegation to provide the necessary "gap" funding for the construction of the Cape Fear Skyway.

CITY OF WILMINGTON COLLECTOR STREET PLAN

Project Description/Scope: Complete a city-wide area collector street plan including Monkey Junction that will: 1) distribute traffic across an appropriate network of arterial and collector streets, not local streets; 2) establish a set of multi-modal cross-sections for collector streets that accommodate all road users and

contribute to the attractiveness of the city; 3) preserve the mobility of the major arterials by limiting the amount of direct access to these facilities; and 4) provide for orderly provision of public utilities within the collector street corridors. The plan will be used by city staff and property owners to reduce congestion and improve mobility throughout the City of Wilmington.

Current Status: The Wilmington MPO has selected Stantec to complete the City of Wilmington Collector Street Plan. Staff is currently awaiting a scope of services and fee proposal.

Next Step: Begin completion of the City of Wilmington Collector Street Plan.

FIT COMMUNITY 2009 GRANT

Project Description/Scope: Submit a designation and grant application to the Fit Community 2009 grant program.

Current Status: The Ann Street Bicycle Boulevard is officially open and grant-funded promotional activities will continue as planned until September 2010. The third event was held on July 17. This event included bicycle safety instruction and bicycle scavenger hunt along the bicycle boulevard. Ten bicycles were awarded to those who participate in the bicycle safety training. Group rides were held on July 24 and August 7.

Next Step: Host the fourth bicycle boulevard event on September 11 at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Community Center followed by a group ride on September 18. Let the Ann Street at South 5th Avenue intersection improvement project for bid in September, with construction to begin in the fall.

<u>5TH AVENUE PAVEMENT MARKING PLAN (No significant change)</u>

Project Description/Scope: Design and implement a pavement marking plan on N. 5th Avenue from Willard Street to Nixon Street. The pavement marking plan will reduce the number of lanes from four to two and incorporate a bicycle lane and parking.

Current Status: Kimley-Horn and Associates was hired to complete the design. The City has received and comments on the 90% design plans. Staff completed the data collection and is currently completing signal warrant analysis at the intersections of 5th Avenue/Grace, 5th/Princess, 5th/Chestnut and 5th/Red Cross.

Next Step: Complete the signal warrant analysis. Receive the 100% design plans. Bid and construct the revised pavement markings.

GARY SHELL CROSS-CITY TRAIL

Project Description/Scope: The Cross City Trail will provide a future bicycle and pedestrian connection from Wade Park, Halyburton Park and Empie Park to the Heide-Trask Drawbridge. Portions of this trail will be constructed in conjunction with the Independence Boulevard and Randall Parkway widening projects. Construction of Phase I along South 17th Street between John D. Barry Drive and the Cameron Art Museum is funded by \$350,000 in ARRA funds from NCDOT. Phase II along Independence Boulevard between Converse Drive and Randall Parkway (which passes through Empie Park and the Devon Park community) is funded through \$1,650,000 in ARRA funds from NCDOT. Phase IIIA is the section between South College Road and Mallard Street, most of which is located on the UNCW campus. Phase IIIG is the section between UNCW and the Autumn Hall Town Center mixed-use development.

Current Status: Construction on Phase I began on February 1 and will be completed in 120 days. Construction on Phase II began on March 1 and will be completed in 180 days. Kimley-Horn Associates, Inc. has almost completed design and permitting for Phases IIIA and IIIG. A public meeting to review the alternative alignments for Phase IIIG was held on June 17 at the Fisher Student Center at UNCW. A second public meeting was held at the New Hanover County Government Center on July 29. A recommended cross-section and alignment along Mallard Street, Rill Road and Teal Street was presented to and approved by City Council on August 3.

Next Step: Phase IIIA and IIIG will be let for bid in the Fall.

KERR AVENUE/MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. PARKWAY CORRIDOR PRESERVATION

Project Description/Scope: NCDT plans to widen Kerr Avenue to a 4-lane divided facility from Randall Parkway to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Parkway and construct an interchange at the intersection of Kerr Avenue and the Martin Luther King, Jr. Parkway. The construction of the widening project is funded by NCDOT; however, the construction of the interchange is currently unfunded. Smith Creek Land Subdivision, a six-lot subdivision, is planned on the northwest quadrant lying within the interchange location.

Current Status: On December 16, 2009 the Wilmington Metropolitan Planning Organization's Transportation Advisory Committee endorsed a resolution requesting the City of Wilmington file a Transportation Corridor Official Map for the interchange at this location. The City filed a Transportation Corridor Official map in May for the interchange on the northwest quadrant. Staff was directed to prepare a transportation corridor official map for the southern quadrant. City Council established August 3rd as the public hearing date for the project. The public hearing was held open from the August 3rd meeting and Council approved filing a Transportation Corridor Official map for the southern quadrant on August 17th.

Next Step: File the Transportation Corridor Official map with the New Hanover County Register of Deeds.

LANE IMPROVEMENTS - MARKET AT NEW CENTER DRIVE:

Project Description/Scope: Increase capacity and decrease delay exiting Target Shopping Center with the addition of a dedicated right turn lane and conversion of the existing right turn to an additional through lane. Developer contribution will also install a right turn lane on Market entering the Dunkin Donuts/Red Roof Inn. City forces will install signal modifications.

Current Status: All asphalt paving work is complete, signal heads installed and awaiting lane changes to activate.

Next Step: Install striping, signing and concrete sidewalks and concrete median island in driveway. Anticipate project is open to traffic week of 8/26.

MARKET STREET CORRIDOR PLAN

Project Description/Scope: Develop a corridor plan for Market Street from Colonial Drive to the Pender County line. This project will integrate transportation and land use planning in an effort to improve safety and mobility along the entire corridor. The plan will provide recommendations for access management, interconnectivity, improved development standards, future collector streets and conceptual designs. On March 6, 2008 the NCDOT approved funding in the amount of \$275,000 for the Wilmington Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), City of Wilmington, New Hanover County and NCDOT to develop the plan.

Current Status: The Wilmington MPO has received the final Market Street Corridor plan.

Next Step: Hold a joint City/County Planning Commission meeting in September and present the corridor plan to City Council, County Commissioners and Transportation Advisory Committee in October.

MULTI-MODAL TRANSPORTATION CENTER (No significant change)

Project Description/Scope: Purchase right-of-way, develop design plans and construct the Wilmington Multi-modal Transportation Center between N. 3rd, N. 4th, Hanover and Red Cross streets.

Current Status: NCDOT has appropriated \$10 million to purchase the properties for the Multi-Modal Transportation Center. The City's local match is \$1 million. NCDOT has reached a settlement with all property owners except U-Haul. The Long Range Transit Needs Study for the Wilmington Multi-modal Transportation Center recommends the acquisition of the U-Haul property. NCDOT hired Moffit & Nichol and Hard Art Studio to complete the conceptual design for the train station north of Campbell and complete structural and hazardous materials evaluations. The conceptual plans are expected by September 10th. NCDOT hired Moffit & Nichol and Ko & Associates to complete the Environmental Assessment (EA) for the Wilmington Multi-modal Transportation Center. This document is expected to be complete within twelve months. NCDOT is pursuing securing an option on the U-Haul property until completion of the EA.

Next Step: Completion of the EA and complete acquisition of the U-Haul property.

NEIGHBORHOOD TRAFFIC STUDIES

Project Description/Scope: The City of Wilmington operates a neighborhood traffic management program to focus on the installation of neighborhood traffic-calming devices that reduce speed and improve safety along neighborhood streets. The City has currently completed neighborhood traffic studies to develop immediate and long-term solutions in 17 Wilmington neighborhoods. The LPA Group has submitted final construction drawings for long-term improvements in 10 neighborhoods.

Current Status: Based on funding, staff has prioritized the locations for installation in Pine Valley East. The City opened bids on May 27th. Barnhill Construction was the low bidder. The purchase order will be included on City Council's August 4th PO Memo. Staff is awaiting some additional information from the contractor.

Next Steps: Construction is anticipated to begin in September 2010.

N. 3RD STREET CORRIDOR STREETSCAPE IMPROVEMENTS

Project Description/Scope: In May 2006, a transportation bond referendum was approved that included \$5 million in improvements to the North 3rd Street corridor. The project includes improvements to traffic flow, utilities, pedestrian safety and streetscape aesthetics. The city has hired Kimley-Horn & Associates (KHA) to complete the engineered design of the corridor.

Current Status: The City has received the 100% final design plans and the opinion of probable costs. The City has accepted ownership and maintenance of North 3rd Street. Staff has worked with Cape Fear Public Utility Authority (CFPUA) to develop an Inter-local Agreement for the construction of the improvements along North 3rd Street. This agreement outlines the cost-sharing and logistical details. The Authority Board and City Council have approved the agreement. Due to some design and issues, the project has been delayed until additional information can be obtained.

Next Step: Bid the construction of the North 3rd Street improvements in September/October. The City anticipates beginning construction of the streetscape corridor enhancements in November/December.

<u>PRINCESS PLACE DRIVE AND SOUTH FRONT STREET PAVEMENT MARKING PLANS (No significant change)</u>

Project Description/Scope: Princess Place Drive and South Front Street (US 421 Truck) are part of a resurfacing package that was let by NCDOT in late 2009. With adjustments to the pavement markings, the existing pavement on both Princess Place Drive and South Front Street (US 421 Truck) should accommodate two motor vehicle lanes, two bicycle lanes, and intermittent left-turn lanes. On December 16, 2009, the Wilmington MPO's Transportation Advisory Committee supported a resolution requesting the City of Wilmington and NCDOT work cooperatively to add on-road bicycle lanes to Princess Place Drive and South Front Street (US 421 Truck) as part of the resurfacing project.

Current Status: Ramey Kemp & Associates has finalized the pavement marking plans. Staff held public meetings on May 20th for the East Wilmington Bicycle/Pedestrian improvements and June 8th for S. Front Street Bicycle Lanes. The attendees at both meetings supported the projects. The final plans have been submitted to NCDOT. NCDOT has began the mill patching on Princess Place Drive.

Next Step: Implement the pavement marking plans for Princess Place Drive and South Front Street as designed by Ramey Kemp & Associates.

SAFELIGHT

Project Description/Scope: This program of traffic signal violation photo image monitoring and enforcement to improve safety on public streets.

Current Status: Contract transfer is complete, all documentation is in hand. The first seven sites are operational. Construction is complete at 23rd and Market and the site started issuance of warning citations the week of 8/16 for 15 days. Installation on Market at New Centre is to start as soon as lane project relocates eastbound stop bars and plans are revised to reflect relocated camera pole. Plans are in hand for 3 of the final four upgrades submitted to NCDOT on 8/26.

Next Step: When plans for the final site are received, forward to NCDOT for permitting. Upgraded equipment at 13 sites is completed in sept. System has maintained existing equipment during transition, only the sites to be abandoned were turned off.

Install New Centre and Market, remove equipment at Market at MLK and 5th and Wooster, submit plans for an upgrade final four sites.

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL: BRADLEY CREEK ELEMENTARY (No significant change)

Project Description/Scope: Construct a 3,100-foot-long sidewalk between Bradley Creek Elementary School and Greenville Village mobile home park and promote use of the sidewalk through various bilingual events and materials.

Current Status: On March 6, 2008, the North Carolina Board of Transportation voted to award the City of Wilmington \$211,800 to fund a demonstration Safe Routes to School project at Bradley Creek Elementary School. On July 1, 2008 the Wilmington City Council endorsed the municipal agreement between the City and NCDOT. Norris, Kuske and Tunstall completed the final design for the sidewalk and pedestrian crossing along Greenville Loop Road.

Next Step: Let project for bid in August/September.

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL: PARK AVENUE AT INDEPENDENCE BOULEVARD (No significant change)

Project Description/Scope: This project will provide a high-visibility, protected location for pedestrians and bicyclists to cross Independence Boulevard at Park Avenue. The crossing will consist of an 8- to 10-foot-wide multi-use path along the north side of Park Avenue between Hawthorne Road and the Empie Park entrance, a striped crosswalk across the northern leg of the intersection, and pedestrian signal heads and push buttons at the northwest and northeast corners of the intersection. This crossing is currently part of the River-to-the-Sea Bikeway and will also be part of the planned Cross-City Trail.

Current Status: After review and refinement, Right Angle Engineering, PC has submitted the 100% design plans to NCDOT. **Staff is still awaiting the encroachment from NCDOT.**

Next Step: Receive encroachment agreement from NCDOT. Let project for bid in August/September.

TRAFFIC SIGNAL SYSTEM UPGRADE/EXPANSION

Project Description/Scope: Final system will have 210+ signals centrally controlled vs. the 160+/-currently under **distributed** control.

Current Status: All contract construction and 30 day observation complete. Cameras at Eastwood at Rogersville, the 6th Street RR Bridge, the Princess Place Fire Station, and the Pine Valley will be connected pending the final documentation for fiber optic testing.

Next Steps: Connect all remaining off system intersections and cameras and begin process of closing out project and completing NCDOT reimbursement requests.

WILMINGTON BYPASS

Project Description/Scope: Construct the Wilmington Bypass from US 421 in New Hanover County to US 17 in Brunswick County.

Current Status: NCDOT has let the design and construction of the Wilmington Bypass Section "A" from US 17 to US 74/76 as a "design-build" project. They anticipate completing this section of the Bypass in 2013. NCDOT prepared an "Urban Loop Prioritization Process" that prioritized the 10 urban loops across the state. NCDOT released the results of the Urban Loop Prioritization Process in August. The Wilmington Bypass "Section B" is funded from FY 2013 through 2020. The project's expected completion date is 2020.

Next Step: Work to identify potential funding to expedite construction of the Wilmington Bypass Section "B".
