1. Call to Order

Mr. Kozlosky called the meeting to order at 10:09 a.m.

2. Approval of Agenda

Mr. Bennett made a motion to approve the agenda as presented, seconded by Ms. Ayers, and the motion carried unanimously.

3. Presentations

a. Cape Fear Moving Forward 2045 MTP - Michael Madsen, WMPO

Ms. Lorenzo gave an update on the Cape Fear Moving Forward 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan. She gave an overview of survey responses that indicated a strong preference for having transportation alternatives, and that the primary mode of transportation to work and/or school is by car.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that to date, the top travel priority is safety, followed by travel time and convenience. She noted that responses indicated a preference for funding more cost-effective alternative transportation followed by identifying new revenue sources. Respondents favored investing funds in bicycle and pedestrian facilities and safety, followed by improving the existing transportation network, additional revenue sources included impact fees on new development, followed by higher gas taxes and tolls. Survey participants identified themselves as primarily white, ranging in age from 55 to 64, with an annual household income of greater than \$100,000.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that the public input map has received 1,417 hits. She displayed a usage timeline for online tools and pointed out that the spikes can be attributed to e-mail blasts to the City's e-mail list. She noted that comments were mostly for roadway and bike/pedestrian modes. She gave examples of the most popular comments for each of the six transportation modes.

In response to concerns expressed by Mr. Serkin, Ms. Lorenzo stated that the City's e-mail list extends to residents beyond City residents.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that staff met with the City's Public Information Officer who recommended digital ads at WECT.com and a social media campaign with paid ads on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram to reach a younger, more diverse population. She displayed examples of the social media ads.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that Mr. Kozlosky wrote a letter for publication in the six local newspapers throughout the region, in which a paid display ad will run as well. Staff has also contacted its 12 environmental justice partners for additional outreach to underserved communities, and distributed surveys and flyers to resource centers such as Social Services, the Employment Security Commission, and the Veterans Affairs, and is pursing outreach to the Wilmington Housing Authority.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that 4,991 total responses have been received to date comprised of more than 1,500 survey responses, 440 comments and 3,000 votes on comments. She reminded members that public outreach period ends July 31st and encouraged members to continue promoting participation.

A brief question/answer and discussion period was held. Mr. Kozlosky stated that staff will present preliminary results and comments in August.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that staff will return with final results in September or October, depending on analysis by the consultant.

4. Consent Agenda

- **b.** Resolution Approving 2018-2027 STIP/MPO TIP Administrative Modification #18-6 Mr. Kozlosky pulled Item 4a (Approval of TCC Meeting Minutes June 13, 2018) for further consideration.
- Mr. Serkin made a motion to approve Item 4b (Resolution Approving 2018-2027 STIP/MPO TIP Administrative Modification #18-6) and to forward it to the Board for consideration. Mr. Bennett seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.
- Mr. Kozlosky stated that Ms. Villegas' first name was misidentified in the TCC Minutes of June 13th. He noted that a correction will be made.

Ms. Avery made a motion to approve the TCC meeting minutes of June 13th as amended, seconded by Ms. Villegas, and the motion carried unanimously.

5. Regular Agenda

a. Resolution approving the allocation of FY 19 Direct Attributable funds to the Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority for ADA and Preventative Maintenance Ms. Kimes reminded the Committee that last month Wave Transit came before the TCC and MPO Board to request \$2.2 million to support the Multi-modal Center downtown. She noted that after considering the potential impact to further funding needs, Wave revised its request to \$1.7 million, and the Board supported it. Now, similar to previous years, Wave is requesting \$500,000 to help support preventative maintenance and ADA compliance.

Ms. Kimes stated that only the Wilmington Fire Department has expressed an interest in applying for funds (for additional pre-emptive signals). She noted that the Wave allocation will complete fiscal year 2019 funds and allow the MPO to move forward with a call for projects for fiscal year 2020 with four projects completed and numerous others under construction.

In response to an inquiry by Mr. Bennett, Ms. Kimes stated that the call for projects for the five-year program would be made prior to October of 2019.

In response to an inquiry by Mr. Serkin, Ms. Kimes estimated a balance of \$100,000 in FY 2019 funds, allowing for the completion of smaller projects.

Following further discussion, Ms. Matheny made a motion to approve the Resolution approving the allocation of FY 19 Direct Attributable funds to the Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority for ADA and Preventative Maintenance. Ms. Avery seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

b. Resolution approving the Regional Impact Local Input Point Assignment for Prioritization 5.0

Ms. Lorenzo stated that an updated draft local input point assignment has been distributed to members. She noted that the Board approved a transfer of 100 points from the Wallace to Castle Hayne project to the Porters Neck/US-17 ramp widening project in the interest of safety and mobility. She added that a change was made to the project limits and cost of the NC 133 Castle Hayne Road widening project, which is also reflected in the updated point assignment. In addition, the southeastern North Carolina passenger rail project from Raleigh to Fayetteville will be awarded additional points from other MPOs that were omitted from the original submission.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that the draft will go before the Board for final approval. She pointed out that the newly announced CSX facility in Edgecombe County might impact the point assignment further.

Following further discussion, Ms. Matheny made a motion to approve the Resolution approving the Regional Impact Local Input Point Assignment for Prioritization 5.0 and to forward to the Board for consideration. Ms. Kimes seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

6. Discussion

a. 2018-2027 STIP/MPO TIP Administrative Modification #18-7

Mr. Kozlosky stated that this item is a statewide modification for informational purposes only, and will be brought back for consideration at the next meeting of the TCC.

b. Wilmington Urban Area MPO FY 18 Omnibus Funding

Ms. Kimes reminded the Committee members that the MPO began receiving the Direct Attributable (DA) funds in 2013. She noted that in 2018, the Omnibus spending bill appropriated additional money to TMAs (Transportation Management Areas) including the WMPO. She stated that the WMPO's STPBG (Surface Transportation Program-Direct Attributable) program would receive about \$577,000 in additional funding that would need to be obligated for construction by September 30, 2021 for highway, bridge or tunnel projects including designated routes of the Appalachian development highway system and local access roads under Section 14-501 of Title 40 USC.

Ms. Kimes stated that past submissions include 21 bicycle/pedestrian projects and one signal pre-emption project; but no roadway or bridge projects. She pointed out that the timeline is very tight. She noted that a competitive process might be followed to allow all jurisdictions to compete for funding or it could be offered to the DOT for a construction-ready project. She requested direction from the group.

Following a brief discussion, Mr. Bennett suggested a City project to offset lefts at St. Andrews Drive and 17th Street since drainage has increased project costs significantly.

He noted that the project would need to be developed further with estimates to see if it's viable given the timeframe.

Ms. Kimes expressed concerns regarding the current availability of City engineers.

Mr. Serkin expressed a preference for a local project to benefit from the funding. He noted that if it were to go to the state, it would benefit the Region or Division tier but not necessarily the MPO. He pointed out that it's not much money for a roadway project.

Mr. Kozlosky stated that the MPO might work cooperatively with the state so that it might benefit as well.

Following further discussion, Mr. Kozlosky stated that staff would reach out to the jurisdictions to determine the feasibility of roadway projects that meet the intent. As a back-up, he recommended staff reach out to DOT.

Mr. Serkin suggested pursuing both plans simultaneously.

7. Updates

Mr. Kozlosky reminded members that the updates are included in the agenda packet.

8. Announcements

- NCDOT Castle Hayne Road Widening and Roundabout July 17th location changed to Operations Center, 1480 Castle Hayne Road.
- Mr. Kozlosky introduced new Associate Transportation Planner, Katie Moore.
- Ms. Moore expressed appreciation and gave a brief overview of her professional background.
- Mr. Kozlosky stated that the next meeting of the TCC will be August 15th.

Ms. Matheny expressed appreciation to the WMPO Board and staff for their efforts. She noted that STP-DA funds were requested to finish the third and final phase of construction/building renovation of the downtown transit facility as part of the larger Multi-modal Transportation Center project. She gave a brief overview of the bid process currently in progress and timeline for the complex construction phase with occupancy anticipated by 2019. She pointed out that this project has been 20 years in the making.

Mr. Bennett suggested compiling the original and construction estimates to help determine a construction cost escalation factor for the jurisdictions. Ms. Kimes responded that the original estimates were perhaps too high level for a comparison. She noted that the City is compiling data for better cost estimating tools.

Mr. Serkin expressed concerns regarding using future costs for estimating DA projects five years out. Mr. Kozlosky responded that an escalation factor will be considered.

9. Adjournment

With no further items, the meeting was adjourned at 11:02 a.m.

WMPO Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee Model Bike Parking Ordinance

Bicycle Parking -

A. Applicability.

- a. The provisions of this section shall apply to all new development, change of use, and/or substantial improvement.¹
- b. It is at the discretion of the Zoning Official to review and require bicycle parking facilities for land uses not specifically designated in this section.
 - i. Criteria to be considered for applicability by the Zoning Official:
 - 1. Type of use.
 - 2. Size of use.
 - 3. Zoning District in jurisdiction.

B. Definitions.

- a. *Bicycle parking space* an area at least 6 feet in length and at least 2 feet in width to accommodate secured storage for 1 bicycle.
- b. Bicycle rack a fixture in which one or more bicycles can be secured
- c. *Short-term bicycle parking* bicycle parking intended for 2 hours or less, appropriate for persons making short visits to commercial establishments.
- d. Long-term bicycle parking bicycle parking intended for a period of 2 hours or longer, appropriate for residents, employees, transit users, and visitors to hotels in the nearby area and at least 50% of the facility shall be covered.
- C. Number of Spaces Required.

¹Applicability of this ordinance shall be determined by the adopting jurisdiction.

Development Standards for bicycle parking spaces.

- a. Short term bicycle parking shall provide sufficient security from theft and damage. Bicycle racks shall be securely anchored to the ground, shall support the bicycle at two or more points to prevent damage to the bicycle, and shall be located in a visible and well-lit area.
- b. Long term bicycle parking shall provide a secure, limited access parking facility. The accommodations shall be well lit and at least 50% of the facility shall be covered. Examples include a room within a multi-family building or workplace, and an enclosure within an existing vehicular parking area.
- c. Recommended bicycle racks include "Inverted U", "Post & Ring", and "Wheelwell-Secure" racks.
- d. Bicycle parking shall be as convenient as auto parking and located within 200 feet from main entrance of structure or facility.

^{**}Bicyclist parking shall be just as convenient as vehicular parking

^{***}Bicyclist parking should be provided for employees in addition to parking required by land use

^{****}Factors for review shall include site access/distance to bicycle facilities such as MUP's, greenways, and bicycle lanes.

e. Bicycle parking shall be sufficiently separated from motor vehicle parking areas to protect bicycles from damage by motor vehicles. When located adjacent to motor vehicle parking or right of ways, bicycle racks shall be located a minimum of 24" from edge of parking lot or roadway, and shall be spaced at a minimum of 36" apart.

D. Development Standards for Multi-Unit Structures

- a. In the case in which a structure has more than one use or unit within the same structure, a bicycle corral can be installed to service all the units housed within the structure.
- b. Bicycle Corrals are bicycle parking facilities that can accommodate up to 12 to 16 bicycles in the same area as a single vehicle parking space.
- c. The objective is to provide sufficient parking for a range of potential uses while also limiting the cost of constructing additional bike racks in the scenario of changes of use within the structure.

WILMINGTON MPO TRANSPORTATION PLANNING AUGUST 2018

2045 METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN

Project Description/Scope: The Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization is required by federal law to update the Metropolitan Transportation Plan every 5 years. The last plan was adopted by the MPO Board on November 18, 2015. The next update is required to be adopted by November 2020. This plan will guide the regional transportation priorities and actions, and be used for project selection in the State/Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Programs. The MPO Board appointed a Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) to help guide the development of this plan. Public outreach began with a kick-off event on April 3rd and ended on July 31st. There were 2,287 transportation survey responses, 563 comments on the public input map tool, and 4,554 votes on map comments, totaling 7,404 responses.

Next Steps:

- WMPO Staff, in coordination with our consultant WSP, have begun data analysis of the public outreach responses and comments.
- The Modal Subcommittees have begun development of modal goals and objectives. These goals
 and objectives will provide the basis for development of modal policies and project scoring
 criteria later in the Fall/Winter.
- Staff will present preliminary project lists to the modal subcommittees in the Fall
- Adoption in November 2020

LELAND STREET DESIGN STANDARDS MANUAL

Project Description/Scope: The Town of Leland is partnering with the Wilmington Urban Area MPO for the development of street design manual. These guidelines will guide new development towards the construction of streets that better align with the town's values in terms of connectivity, multi-modal activity, maintenance, design, and safety. The Leland Street Design Manual will includes conceptual tables/graphics which will more easily convey the impact of standards on the physical landscape to the public and elected officials. A public meeting was held on December 4th to review the draft materials. The document was revised and a follow-up meeting was held on February 20th. Staff from the Town continues to work on the development of these standards. MPO staff met with the Town on May 22nd. The Town provided the MPO with a list of questions, proposed changes and comments. The MPO has assigned a team to assist in the completion of the manual.

The Agreement with NCDOT for the full-time TDM Coordinator position was approved on November 4, 2015. The TDM Coordinator position has been filled with the new employee starting on May 14th. The TDM program will work to increase active transportation initiatives and increase community knowledge of commuter options. The WMPO is working with the city of Wilmington to implement a bike share program. Next Steps:

- Finalized Strategic Marketing Plan
- Increase social media presence for Go Coast program and initiatives
- Communicating with ride share/commute tracking applications to develop commuter tracking for 2018 Commuter Challenge
- Have grown Go Coast/TDM committee by seven members
- Go Coast Meeting August 8th, 2018
- Gather model alternative work schedule policies from various regional employers to be highlighted in the statewide initiative to showcase model alternative work schedules
- Create list of Commuter Friendly Employers in the WMPO region

Cape Fear Public Transportation Authority Project Update August 2018

REGIONAL AUTHORITY PROJECTS

- 1. Bus fleet replacement FTA funding in the amount of \$3.6M for nine replacement buses was awarded to the Authority from a nationwide discretionary grant in April 2018. Seven buses were ordered June 29, 2018. Delivery is scheduled to begin in June 2019. Additional funding for three to four buses will be requested from the VW mitigation settlement once a call for projects is issued by NC DAQ in the summer of 2018.
- 2. Short Range Transportation Plan (no significant change) following adoption of Cape Fear Transportation 2040 by the Wilmington Metropolitan Planning Organization (WMPO), Wave Transit is completing its latest short range plan. The plan will set a course for public transportation initiatives, route structure, and revenue programming for the next five years. The plan will also include a financial element to ensure that transit programs are compliant with FTA rules and regulations. Under the direction of the Authority's Operations and Planning Committee made up of funding partners, Board members, staff, WMPO board members, WMPO staff, passengers, interested citizens, and professional transit planning consultants, the plan is an important tool in identifying and quantifying the public transportation needs of the community. Marketing, public relations, and community support for financing transit in Southeastern North Carolina will also be a focus of the plan. A key component of the plan will be extensive surveying and data collection to assess the needs of current and prospective passengers. Nelson Nygaard is the principal consultant leading the project. Data collection has begun and is being analyzed. Over fifteen agencies are assisting Wave Transit as stakeholders in the planning effort. The stakeholder committee has been identified and held their multiple meeting. The project is expected to be completed in the spring of 2018.

The draft plan was presented to the Authority Board on March 22, 2018. Draft recommendations are available at the following

URL: https://www.wavetransit.com/short-range-transit-plan/. Changes to the Wave Transit routes based on recommendations from the consultant will be developed over the summer and fall with implementation in 2019 to coincide with the opening of the Wilmington Multimodal Transportation Center. A presentation of the study findings will be presented to the WMPO in the fall of 2018.

3. Long Term Funding - (no change) currently, the Authority does not have a dedicated source of local funding. A consultant led study to evaluate the governing model and long term funding for transit in the region has been commissioned by the City of Wilmington and New Hanover County. TransPro Consulting has been retained to undertake the effort.

WMPO SPONSORED PROJECTS

1. Wilmington Multimodal Transportation Center

Phase 1 - an Interlocal Agreement between Authority, City of Wilmington, WMPO, and NCDOT has been executed. Demolition of the U-Haul building is complete. Thanks to generous support from the WMPO, STP-DA funding in the amount of \$2,400,000 has been flexed by FHWA to FTA for the project and a formal grant with FTA has approved. Phase 1 consisting of hazardous materials abatement and demolition is complete. Phase 2 consisting of building stabilization is complete.

Phase 3 consisting of renovation construction was let for bidding on February 14, 2018. Bids for Phase 3 were opened on March 13, 2018. On March 22, 2018, the Authority resolved to reject all bids due to the lowest bid exceeding available funds for the project.

The renovation construction phase has been further divided into two phases to meet current funding requirements. Renovation construction phase one, consisting of sitework to construct drive aisles, stormwater and bus canopies was let for bid on April 13, 2018. A single bid was received in response to the IFB. The number of bids received was non-complaint with NCGS §143-132(a).

Following value engineering, the project was released for bid on June 03, 2018. Bids were opened on July 03, 2018. Monteith Construction of Wilmington was the lowest responsive bidder.

Phase 2 - on June 27, 2018 the WMPO awarded up to \$1,700,000 in additional STBGP-DA funding to complete the project. The flex process to convert the funds from FHWA to FTA was initiated on July 30, 2018. Monteith Construction of Wilmington was the lowest responsive bidder. A construction contract will be considered by the Authority on August 23, 2018. Construction is expected to begin in September 2018. Project completion is contingent upon the availability of STBGP-DA funding and the amount of time taken to complete the flex process.

2. Preventive Maintenance & ADA - STBGP-DA funding in the amount of \$510,778 for preventive maintenance and ADA service throughout the region was approved by the WMPO in 2016. The process of flexing the funds from FHWA to FTA is complete and a grant for the funding has been submitted to FTA. The funds will assist the Authority in maintaining its fleet of fixed route buses and FTA funded facilities to meet the FTA State of Good Repair Requirement. The preventive maintenance funding will ensure that Wave Transit vehicles are safe, reliable, and provide a positive and comfortable experience on Wave Transit routes throughout the region.

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance utilized under the funding will be used to offset the cost of providing complementary ADA service for passengers unable to access Wave Transit fixed routes. Paratransit services provided under the WMPO authorized funding include specialized origin to destination van service. In June 2018 the Authority provided 1,834 ADA passenger trips. The period of performance for the project is 07/01/2017 through 06/30/2018. *Project complete*.

Carolina Bays Parkway Extension

Project Overview and Purpose

The N.C. Department of Transportation, along with the S.C. Department of Transportation, is planning to build a multi-lane expressway that extends Carolina Bays Parkway (S.C. 31) from S.C. 9 in Horry County, S.C., across the North Carolina state line to U.S. 17 in Brunswick County.

The extension would provide a more direct and efficient movement of traffic seeking to bypass congestion within the areas of Calabash in North Carolina as well as Little River and the Grand Strand areas in South Carolina. It would also improve traffic flow and sfety at the intersection of S.C. 9 and S.C. 57 and provide a more direct route for coastal truck traffic moving through North Carolina.

Project Highlights

A team of engineering firms, led by CALYX Engineers and Consultants, is under contract to conduct project development and environmental studies, which are being led by NCDOT and SCDOT in cooperation with local, state and federal agencies in both states.

Project development and environmental studies are underway to evaluate potential routes for the roadway from an engineering and environmental standpoint and to select a preferred route.

Currently only programmed for planning and environmental study. No schedule has been established for right-of-way acquisition or construction, which is not currently funded in North Carolina.

AUGUST TPD UPDATES WILMINGTON MPO

August 2018

Wilmington Model Update – Wilmington MPO has requested that TPD update their model to a base year of 2015, previously the base year was 2010. The model is being updated so it can be accurately used in the next MTP. Currently, the engineers at TPD are setting up future year model, the MPO has sent in future year socio economic projections and the engineers at TPD have incorporated that into the model. The MPO is working on project list verification and once the NCDOT TPD receives that, they will continue working on the future 2045 model. There is still some information for the locals to verify, and we are hoping that if there are no further changes that need to be made – the future year model run will be made before end of August.

Wilmington CTP – With the model update, WMPO has also asked TPD to start on the Wilmington CTP update. We have yet to develop a schedule for this CTP and start – but once the Wilmington Model is near completion we will develop a schedule.

Statewide Plan: TPD has selected WSP as the consultant for the Statewide Plan. A limited notice to proceed (NTP) has been issued to begin initial groundwork for this plan, and full NTP is anticipated in late July/early August. As stakeholders, MPO/RPOs will be engaged throughout the process.

Corridor Studies: After establishing the Strategic Transportation Corridor (STC) network in 2015, the next step in implementation is the development of STC master plans, which are intended to establish a vision for each of the end-to-end corridors. Work began in early 2018 on the first two STC master plans, as follows:

- Bundle #1 has been assigned to Kimley-Horn and includes Corridor P (Future I-42/US 70E/ NCRR from I-440 in Wake County to Port at Morehead City),
 Corridor S (I-795/US 117 from I-95 in Wilson County to I-40 in Sampson County), and Corridor X (US 258/NC 11/US 13 from US 17 in Onslow County to US 64E in Edgecombe County)
- Bundle #2 has been assigned to Atkins, and includes Corridor U (US 74W/US 74E/I 74 from I-26 in Polk County to US 117 in Wilmington) and Corridor D (US 321/CSX from South Carolina state line to Tennessee state line).

TPD has recently made the decision to temporarily pause the development of the STC Master Plans in order to reevaluate the scope and deliverables to make it a more useful and effective end product. A work group of internal and external partners to help reexamine this effort is currently being formed.

Traffic Forecast: The Traffic Forecast shapefile is under development (ArcGIS Online).

HERE Data: HERE Data is available for use for NCDOT business purposes, subsequently being available for RPO use. Data available for travel times and speed measures across the state. Program available at: https://pda.ritis.org/suite

FHWA News: Functional Classification - FHWA has an interactive map that shows the Federal highway system, freight network, fatal crashes, MPO information, and demographic maps at the county level.

Build NC: Governor Roy Cooper on Wednesday signed into law the <u>Build NC Bond Act</u> of 2018, a new financing tool sought by his administration to help expedite critical highway <u>projects</u>. Build NC is a financing tool similar to Garvee bonds and is an important way to move critical projects forward. It is important to note that it is not new revenue, but borrowing authority to implement projects sooner. The focus is for projects in the regional and Division tiers.

CTP 2.0: TPD leadership is reviewing elements for CTP 2.0 and coordinating with the CTP 2.0 steering committee as we prepare for implementation of improved maps, classifications, analysis, plan documentation, and changes to the process for developing CTPs in NC. (A CTP Steering Committee meeting was held June 18, 2018.) Improving the CTPs for NCDOT and local partners has proven to be a complex process with many benefits and "ripple effects" as we move future proposals into project implementation.

Brunswick County Model and CTP: The Brunswick County model is ongoing and future year model run is expected to be complete by end of August, soon after that the

model will close out. After the model is complete, the Brunswick County CTP will start in the new CTP 2.0 format.

Pender County CTP: The Cape Fear RPO has requested that Pender County CTP start as soon as possible, therefore, TPD plans on starting that study fall of this year in the new CTP 2.0 format.
