1) Call to Order

Vice-Chair Rebekah Roth called the remote meeting to order at 10:01 a.m.

Pursuant to Section 4.31 of Senate Bill 704 (Session Law 2020-3), Deputy Director Lorenzo called the roll. A quorum was present, as follows:

3) Presentations

a. 2020 Congestion Management Process Draft Report- Zach Manfredi, WMPO

Associate Transportation Planner Zachary Manfredi gave a presentation on the 2020 Congestion Management Process (CMP) Biennial Report. He noted that last month, the consultant, Kittelson & Associates, reported on the National Performance Management Research Data Set (NPMRDS) for this report. Since July, staff has met with regional stakeholders to receive feedback on proposed strategies for the report, which has been compiled and will be made available online.

Mr. Manfredi gave an overview of the regional measures and metrics for each of the goals and objectives that reflect those of the Cape Fear Moving Forward 2045 Metropolitan Transportation

Plan. He noted that 14 regional maps have been added to the report to help visualize the results. For example, the Volume/Capacity snapshot shows high traffic corridors of the Cape Fear Memorial Bridge, College Road, Market Street and Carolina Beach Road that connect residential areas to the centralized destinations of downtown, midtown and the university. Another snapshot indicates pedestrian sustainability areas in the MPO region.

Mr. Manfredi gave an overview of corridor scoring with seven measures contributing to travel time reliability, and five to multimodal considerations. He commented that most CMPs stop at the regional analysis and scoring level. However, this report continues the trend of the previous report to provide more in-depth information by including current projects and plans, and additional strategies. This report is a starting point for a true corridor analysis.

Mr. Manfredi explained the context of the CMP within the transportation planning process. He said that its development is guided by corridors and goals of the 30-plus-year Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP). He noted that analysis in the CMP can be used to identify additional strategies for inclusion in the 20-plus-year Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) from which projects move to the 10-year MPO Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP). He added that the CMP supports the inclusion of projects in the MPO's TIP. Regarding the timeline of future CMPs, two more reports will be created before the adoption of the 2050 MTP, and an additional prioritization process will likely occur before the adoption of the State's TIP, which may be influenced by the CMP findings.

Mr. Manfredi said that two future considerations for the CMP include data sources and non-recurring congestion. He noted that as a data-driven document, staff strives to keep the CMP updated with the latest technology and analysis tools. The NPMRDS has significantly expanded the CMP data sets from tens of runs for travel time to thousands of runs. He added that data collection for transit, bicycle, and pedestrian would improve the report in the future.

Mr. Manfredi said that most CMPs focus on recurring congestion; although, traffic incidents, weather, tourism, and large special events contribute to traffic congestion. He anticipated that NPMRDS will play a large role in collecting this data.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that the draft report will be brought back to the TCC and the MPO Board in January for consideration.

5) Regular Agenda

a. Resolution adopting Cape Fear Moving Forward 2045 and the 2045 Wilmington Regional Travel Demand Model

Deputy Director Abby Lorenzo stated that in July after two and a half years of work on the Cape Fear Moving Forward 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), the MPO Board adopted a resolution approving the final draft. She noted that the MPO is federally required to approve a resolution adopting the final plan by November 18, 2020 at the expiration of the 2040 plan. This resolution would also approve the 2045 Wilmington Regional Travel Demand Model.

Mr. Cannon made a motion to adopt Cape Fear Moving Forward 2045 and the 2045 Wilmington Regional Travel Demand Model, and to forward them to the MPO Board for consideration. Ms. Lacer seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously by rollcall as follows:

b. Resolution adopting the Wilmington Rail Trail Master Plan

Ms. Lorenzo gave a presentation on the Wilmington Rail Trail Master Plan. She stated that in January 2020, the MPO partnered with the Friends of the Wilmington Rail Trail for the development of a master plan for the rail corridor located in downtown Wilmington between 3rd Street and McRae Street. She noted that public engagement in the form of a two-day charette was prevented by the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in March. After monitoring the situation, the core team devised an alternate strategy of holding virtual meetings with stakeholders (June and July) and engaging the public with a survey for three weeks. A press release was sent to the news media in September, and a YouTube video (https://youtu.be/MJD6j4h3_Zw) featuring City of Wilmington Mayor Bill Saffo, MPO Board member Charlie Rivenbark and Arts Council Executive Director Rhonda Bellamy was produced to generate awareness and feedback.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that 1,914 people participated in the survey generating more than 2,400 written comments. More than 90% of participants agreed that they would visit the trail if built. Three-quarters of respondents indicated they would use the trail for recreation and exercise, 14% for social/family gatherings, and 4% for commuting to work. The top-three benefits of the trail included a safer place to walk or bike, improved quality of life, and enhanced access to downtown/Northside neighborhoods. More than 1,000 comments expressed support for the inclusion of aesthetic and educational elements along the trail, especially those emphasizing the historic importance of the corridor.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad was completed in 1840 and was the longest railroad segment in the world at one point. Passenger rail service ceased in downtown Wilmington in 1968 and the tracks were removed from the corridor when the then Atlantic Coast Railroad moved out of Wilmington. A feasibility study was completed in 2004 to identify interest in re-establishing passenger rail service downtown. She noted that the concept of a multi-use path

was included in the 2013 Wilmington/New Hanover County Greenway Plan. In 2017, the City sought to secure access to the railbed from NCDOT through legislation, as well as opportunities, such as the gulch initiative, to install a multi-use path in the corridor. In 2019, the Wilmington City Council tapped the Friends of the Wilmington Rail Trail organization to advance the rail trail. In turn, the Friends of the Wilmington Rail Trail reached out to partner with the MPO.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that the master plan outlines the goals of the plan, existing conditions of the corridor, linkage opportunities, area development potential, and recommendations for a three-phased implementation, alignment, access points, network safety enhancements, and future extension. Other recommendations include public art, and amenities. Next steps would involve preliminary engineering and design, securing funds, and exploring grant funding. Total construction costs are estimated at around \$5.4 million.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that the master plan will go to the MPO Board for consideration on November 18, to City Council on December 1, and to the Friends of the Wilmington Rail trail on December 9. She noted that the master plan is available online at www.wmpo.org/wilmington-rail-trail/.

Mr. Flanagan asked if staff has discussed with the NCDOT Rail Division the potential need for a barrier between the rail (tracks) and the multi-use path. Ms. Lorenzo commented that NCDOT Rail Division has been a wonderful partner in the development of the rail trail master plan.

In response to an inquiry by Mr. Cannon, Ms. Lorenzo stated that an at-grade access is proposed for both ends of the rail trail, and that ADA standards are proposed for ramp access at 5th Avenue, which is considered the mid-point of the rail trail.

Ms. Lacer inquired about law enforcement involvement. Ms. Lorenzo responded that the Wilmington Police Department was involved during the stakeholder interview process.

Following further consideration, Ms. Lacer made a motion to adopt the Wilmington Rail Trail Master Plan. Ms. Barefoot seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously by rollcall as follows:

In response to an inquiry by Ms. Roth, Ms. Lorenzo stated that this item would go to the MPO Board for discussion and return to the TCC and the MPO Board for consideration.

b. FY22 Budget Discussions

Ms. Lorenzo stated that a memo has been included in the agenda packet regarding the fiscal year 2022 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). She noted that the first two items are related to an estimated half year of operating costs (\$15,000) associated with moving to a new office space in January 2022, plus a half year of salary and benefits (\$35,000) for an administrative assistant.

Other budget considerations include the 2050 Travel Demand Model (\$500,000) instrumental in forecasting travel patterns in the region, and the future of the Transportation Demand Management Program if grant funding were to end.

Ms. Lorenzo stated that staff is in the process of assessing the needs of member jurisdictions. She noted that the Town of Leland has expressed an interest in a transit study. She requested that planning needs by forwarded to her by December 11. She added that any increase in member dues are anticipated to be minimal.

WHEREAS, on July 18, 2012 the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization was designated as a Transportation Management Area (TMA); and

WHEREAS, on December 4, 2015 President Obama signed the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act; and

WHEREAS, the development and adoption of a Congestion Management Process is required of all designated TMAs; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Highway Administration defines a Congestion Management Process as a regionally-accepted approach for managing congestion that provides up-to-date information on transportation system performance and assesses alternative strategies for congestion management that meet state and local needs; and

WHEREAS, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization adopted the initial Congestion Management Process on December 11, 2013 and established performance measures for evaluating and monitoring system performance and serves as a baseline for congestion in the region; and

WHEREAS, following the adoption of the Congestion Management Process, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization has prepared and adopted a report on a biennial basis in 2016 and 2018; and

WHEREAS, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization recognized the need and opportunity to review and update the performance and system monitoring measures in order to align with the vision and goals Cape Fear Moving Forward 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization has collected the necessary data over the course of the past 2 years to evaluate and monitor system performance and evaluate the current congestion needs for the Wilmington Urban Area.

Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization Draft 2021 Legislative Agenda

Corridor Preservation

The Wilmington Urban Area MPO requests the General Assembly identify techniques and continue support corridor protection that is vital implement projects in the state of North Carolina. The MPO requests the North Carolina General Assembly reinstate our previous protections included in the Map Act legislation and continue to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the Wilmington Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization for the filing of the Transportation Corridor maps for the Hampstead Bypass (R-3300). The MPO also requests the North Carolina General Assembly and North Carolina Department of Transportation provide funding for advanced right-of-way acquisition for larger transportation projects.

Transportation Funding

The Wilmington Urban Area MPO supports prioritization and funding for local transportation and infrastructure projects and the need to explore new transportation and infrastructure revenue sources to address the growing needs of the state and the nation. Including, but not limited to road, bridges and highway projects, public transportation, ferry, bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure, beach nourishment, inlet and waterway maintenance, coastal storm damage reduction, port infrastructure, airports, etc.

The Wilmington Urban Area MPO encourage the North Carolina Department of Transportation, North Carolina General Assembly, and Governor of North Carolina to explore and implement new funding mechanisms that could raise the funds necessary to accelerate much needed transportation projects.

Transportation Project Priorities

Due to NCDOT cash management issues, many projects across the state and in our region were delayed in the STIP/MPO TIP. The Wilmington Urban Area MPO supports the acceleration of the MPO's top priorities for projects currently funded in the adopted 2020-2029 State/MPO Transportation Improvement Programs. The Board's transportation priorities are as follows:

- Hampstead Bypass (R-3300)
- *Military Cutoff Road/Eastwood Road Interchange (U-5710)*
- Independence Boulevard Extension (U-4434)
- Martin Luther King Jr. Parkway/Kerr Avenue Interchange (U-3338C)
- Martin Luther King Jr. Parkway/Market Street/Eastwood Road Interchange (U-4902C)

The MPO Board also identified the replacement of the Cape Fear Memorial Bridge as their highest unfunded priority.

Opposition to Transfer of State Road Maintenance

The Wilmington Urban Area MPO respectfully and urgently requests the North Carolina General Assembly reject proposals which would transfer responsibility for large portions of the state's road system to local governments, and weaken or dismantle municipal Powell Bill Street maintenance funding.

Limitation on City Requirements for Street Improvements Related to Schools

Senate Bill 257 included language related to street improvements for schools. The Wilmington Urban Area MPO is concerned that on non-state maintained facilities where improvements

related to schools are needed, the funding burden has fallen on the municipalities or the level of service on the roadways will be compromised. The Wilmington Urban Area MPO encourages the General Assembly to review this language and seek solutions to address this funding concern.

Moped Legislation

The Wilmington Urban Area MPO supports the North Carolina Department of Transportation's policy recommendation of restricting mopeds on public roadways with posted speed limits of 45 mph or greater. The MPO also encourages the North Carolina General Assembly to implement laws that regulate the use of mopeds in a manner that promotes the safety and welfare of the citizens and visitors of North Carolina and pursue education and clarity on existing regulations for mopeds, golf carts, and low-speed vehicles.

Electric Scooter Legislation

The Wilmington Urban Area MPO supports the use of electric scooters to provide an alternative mode of transportation so long as the scooters are used in a safe and responsible manner, do not create visual clutter, and do not block parking or ADA accessibility. The allowance and/or use of electric scooters should be subject to local government control through their adopted codes and ordinances.







TRANSPORTATION DEMAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Project Description/Scope: UNCW is taking the role as lead employer for the Cape Fear region. The WMPO will coordinate with UNCW to work with other major employers in the region to identify opportunities for public outreach, marketing, carpooling, vanpooling, alternative/compressed work schedules, Emergency Guaranteed Ride Home, park and ride lots, etc. The MPO adopted "Work Cape Fear: Expanding Commuter Options in the Cape Fear Region" TDM Short Range Plan on January 28, 2015 and also authorized staff to apply for a TDM grant through NCDOT that funded a full-time TDM Coordinator position. The Agreement with NCDOT for the full-time TDM Coordinator position was approved on November 4, 2015. The TDM program works to increase active transportation initiatives and increase community knowledge of commuter options. The MPO finalized the Strategic Marketing Plan for the "Go Coast" program. In addition, the WMPO has been working with the City of Wilmington to implement a bike share program. The TDM program has continued to grow and progress and below are project status and next steps.

Project Status and Next

Steps: Initiatives

- 1. Watch For Me NC
- a. The City of Wilmington has partnered with NCDOT for 2020 Watch For Me NC bicycle and pedestrian safety program. Watch for Me NC task force comprised of WPD, WFD, Go Coast, Wilmington Engineering, and NHRMC are convening monthly
- b. Due the inability of the police to hold in-person events. Watch for Me NC is being heavily marketed on social media and billboards throughout Wilmington. The NCDOT cancelled law enforcement trainings in response to COVID-19.
- c. Go Coast collaborated with the City of Wilmington's communications department to place Watch for Me NC images on digital billboards throughout town for a total of four weeks. Go Coast, the WMPO, and the City of Wilmington posted WFMNC messages on social media throughout October and November
- 2. The 2020 Go Coast Commuter Challenge was held October 16-30
- a. A strong emphasis was placed on telecommuting this year
- b. 90 participants reduced 5,661 vehicle miles, saved \$900 worth of fuel, and burned 5,900 calories from biking and walking
- c. Lidl, Trader Joe's, Ogden Taproom, Two Wheeler Dealer, and Whole Foods donate gift cards to be given away as prizes to the top participants
- d. The Go Coast Committee and the WMPO Bike/Ped Committee will explore opportunities to re-brand and increase participation for future Commuter Challenge events
- 3. Wilmington was designated a Bronze Level Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists (LAB) in April 2020
- a LAB has provided feedback about how to become more bicycle friendly.
- b. A Bicycle Friendly Community Taskforce of CoW and WMPO staff is being assembled to

evaluate the feedback and make progress to become Silver by the next application in 2024. This taskforce will begin meeting in early 2021

- 4. Short Range TDM Plan Change in Motion 2020
- a. a draft plan was approved by the Go Coast Committee in the November 2020 meeting.
- b. Public comment period took place from December 3, 2020 to January 3, 2021 and received over 50 comments
- c. Go Coast staff will review comments and provide recommended changes to the Go Coast Committee
- d. The Go Coast Committee will consider the approval of the final draft of the plan in the February meeting
- 5. Bike Share and Micromobility

Scooter Share

- a. By request of the WMPO Bike/Ped Committee, Go Coast is performing a review of member jurisdiction ordinances pertaining to alternative transportation amenities requirements in development
- 7. Next Go Coast meeting is February 18, 2021 at 3:00 and will take place virtually.



1. Network Redesign - On January 21, 2020, the City of Wilmington and New Hanover County each adopted a Concurrent Resolution of the Wilmington City Council and the Board of Commissioners of New Hanover County for Enhanced Public Transportation Operations and Efficiency. TransPro Consulting was retained by New Hanover County and the City of Wilmington to serve as consultant to the board during the evaluation process.

A network redesign proposal was developed by TransPro Consulting and presented to the Wave Transit board for consideration on July 23, 2020. The proposal was refined to include comments provided by Authority staff and the Wave Transit board. A revised proposal was presented to the Wave Transit board during the August 27, 2020 meeting. The framework for a revised transportation network outlined in the consultant's proposal was approved by the Wave Transit board on Thursday, October 22, 2020. A summary of the revised system network includes eight (8) fixed bus routes, from the current fourteen (14), increased service frequency for three (3) fixed bus routes, and a micro-transit service offering.

The implementation date of July 1, 2021 for the revised network has since been revised to August 18, 2021. Further information regarding the recommendations included in the proposal, opportunities for comment and a timeline of events will be released to the public in the coming weeks.

2. Onboarding of New Executive Director - Ms. Marie Parker, appointed by the Authority's Board of Directors in November 2020, was seated on Monday, December 7, 2020. Ms. Parker has over 14 years of senior level management experience in the public transportation industry and comes from GoRaleigh, the transit system responsible for operating majority of the public transportation services in Raleigh, North Carolina. We welcome Ms. Parker as part of the Wave Transit team.

JANUARY 2021

Brunswick County Model: The Brunswick County Model was completed in February of this year.

Brunswick County Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP): We have officially started the Brunswick County CTP. The first meeting was on 10/27/2020 with our Core Steering Committee. The second meeting was held on 12/10/2020 and this was the first Steering Committee Meeting. The next meeting will be on 1/14/2021 where we will start working on our vision, goals and objectives.

Wilmington Model: The 2045 Travel Demand Model and 2045 Wilmington MPO MTP was adopted on 11/18/2020 by the Wilmington MPO Board.

NC Moves 2050: The last round of surveys closed on 11/9/2020. The team has made changes to the NC Moves 2050 plan based on comments received. The plan has been submitted to the governor's policy staff and they are awaiting that approval prior to going to the NCDOT Board of Transportation.

Strategic Transportation Corridors (STC): All MPOs and RPOs along US 74 have signed resolution letters in support of US 74 and US 321. The US 74 STC has been completed.

NCDOT Risk and Resiliency Strategy Report: This report is a requirement for all state agencies as a result of the 2020 NC Risk Assessment and Resilience Plan.

Contract Awarded to Improve Brunswick County Roads: A recently awarded contract will improve more than 30 miles of Brunswick County roads and ramps.

S.T. Wooten Corporation of Wilson was awarded a \$5.6 million contract in October to mill and resurface lanes and reconstruct shoulders on 33.6 miles of roadway within the county.

The areas of work include one section each of U.S. 17, U.S. 74/76 and N.C. 130 and 11 sections of secondary roads.

The contractor can begin construction as early as mid-March 2021, and it is expected to be complete by October 2022.

2021 Watch for ME NC Program: NC communities interested in participating in the 2021 Watch for Me NC Program safety program may not submit applications to the Governors Highway Safety Program. The nationally recognized program focuses on reducing bicycle and pedestrian injuries and fatalities through public education, community engagement partnerships with local law enforcement. The 2021 campaign is supported by the Governor's Highway Safety Program and the N.C. Department of Transportation's Integrated Mobility Division. Interesting communities are encouraged to register for a webinar at 11am on January 8, 20221. Applications are due on February 1, 2021 and can be submitted online.
